LONG BEACH.—More than 5000 varieties of blossoms will greet visitors to the fourth annual exhibit of the Long Beach Dahlia and Floral Society, was the announcement today of Gilbert W. Arnold, manager of the show. Scheduled for September 8th and 9th at the new \$3,000,000 municipal auditorium, the show already has entries from more than 35 Southland cities.
Among the cities of this section to be represented are Redondo Beach, Torrance, Gardena, Moneta, Inglewood, Manhattan Beach, Wilmington, San Pedro and Compton. A rare collection of orchids valued at \$10,000 will be on display, the largest exhibit of this exquisite bloom ever shown on the Pacific coast, presented by Arm-coast and Royston, of Sawtelle. This firm is out for first prize in the orchid class and has spared no effort to garner the finest available blossoms.
To top the already imposing list of entries, came word today of a special gardenia exhibit. Manager Arnold announced the receipt of an entry from the Gardena King of the Pacific, Tom Wright of Los Angeles, who promises a comprehensive display of this exquisite blossom, the finishing touch of the man about town, and the preferred corsage of lovely ladies everywhere.

Capital Stock And Processing Taxes Due Soon

Collector of Internal Revenue John P. Carter announced today that the time for filing capital stock tax returns by corporations and similar associations has been extended to September 29.
Collector Carter further said that all corporations and associations similar in character in legal existence must file capital stock tax returns in duplicate and pay a tax of \$1.00 per even thousand dollars on the adjusted declared value of their stock as of June 30, 1932. The tax must be paid when the return is filed on or before September 29.
Corporations even though they claim exemption from tax payment must file returns and file application for such exemption therewith. Collector Carter also states that retailers liable to floor tax returns for the processing tax on wheat must file returns in duplicate and pay tax on or before September 6, 1933.

Wholesalers liable for cotton processing tax must file returns and pay tax on or before August 31 and retailers liable for cotton processing tax must file returns and pay tax on or before September 30, 1933. All these returns must be filed in duplicate properly signed and sworn to. Failure to do this may incur penalties for delinquency.
