erous Complaints Are Filed; Trouble Partially Due to Haste In Setting Up Work Jobs, Will Be Adjusted

At a special meeting of the Lomita-Harbor City Business Men's Association, held Tuesday night, the report-of a special committee, appointed to investigate the C. W. A. situation here was heard and discussed and the committee asked to bring in a further report on January 11, at 8 p. m., in the K. P. hall.

The committee, appointed at a special meeting last week, has Charles M. Smith as chairman, F. Attractive Powers, Joe La Porte, Frank Buker, F. B. Boyle, William Myerscough and C. F. King, and was assisted by a committee of four from the Harbor City Ameri-

can_Legion post.

The situation, as explained by the chairman and other members, was that the C. W. A. in rushing work orders had exceeded the quota of 60,000 allowed Los Angeles county by 8,000 and therefore until the quota had been reduced or additional quota allowed, which has been requested from Washington, no more work orders can be given out as there is no money to pay them.

Classified workers are not yet being called to any extent but will be soon and the trouble will all be ironed out within a short time, according to reports of the committeemen after a conference with the local foreman, W. B. Moss, Mr. Donnelly in charge of the district, Mr. Ferguson and Mr. Tinems, local supervisor.

The general trend of the reports indicated that patience is needed to allow the program to be worked out as it was impossible to launch such a big work program on such short notice without some mistakes, and agitation and dissension over some men losing out on the first call might jeopardize all the jobs held here by local men.

Mr. Myerscough reported that about 69 Harbor City men were working now and Smith reported between 160 and 200 Lomita men.

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Mr. Smith, R. H. Blegel, commander of Harbor City post; Mr. La Porte, Mr. Myerscough and Mr. Powers, spoke briefly, Mr. La Porte bringing out the fact that men who signed up falsely, claiming to be skilled in certain lines, would, if unable to do the work, would, if unable to do the work, not only lose that Job but all C. W. A. work, and he urged them all to register carcully. Men who come on the job drunk or fall to appear for work, lose out and other men on the list will be called to fill their places.
