The clubs entering the new circuit last meeting are as follows: Redondo Merchants, North Redondo, Torrance, Hermosa Beach, Hermosa Beach Mexican Club, Mines Field, Manhattan Beach, Gardena, Harbor City and Union Oil Company of Wilmington. Teams from Hawthorne, Inglewood, Wilmington, San Pedro and the Compton teams have applied for entrance and two teams from this group will be selected at the final meeting next week.

The league will play benefit games in mid-season with the teams from the Santa Monica Bay League and the money will be entered in the players' accident fund.
