Weekly Questions and Answers of Interest to Everyone

Question: Is it true that some schools have a director of visual education?

Answer: Yes! Kansas City has a "director of visual education," and that is a big step forward in making school possible and interesting for all students. On the theory that a picture often tells a story better and more quickly than words, the material was collected. The method of instruction is to project slides or a short motion picture scene, followed by pupils' discussion of what they have seen. For the student who has to fight fatigue symptoms for a child to whom "near point vision" is tor-

ture, this method is literally painless instruction. I am glad to see teachers and school boards recognizing this problem of deficient eyes and doing something about it. You as a parent must do your part in cherishing the eyes of your own family.
