



# WEST MARINE LEAGUE WILL STAGE FINALS AT LEUZINGER

Change Made in Schedule of Track Events to Give New League Opportunity to Hold Preliminaries and Finals Among Members of This Group

West Marine League will have a preliminary and final meet of its own this spring, according to arrangements which have just been completed. It will also participate in the regular Marine League events as scheduled, since the division of the old Marine League into two units will not be officially completed until after the finals this year.

The West Marine events will be held at Leuzinger high school in Hawthorne, the preliminary try-outs coming on Tuesday, April 17, and the finals on Friday, April 20. In place of the regular triangular meets which had been set for that day.

It is probable that North Long Beach will not enter in these events, but the other five teams, Torrance, Narbonne, Gardena, El Segundo and Leuzinger, will compete.

Winners in the West Marine finals will go into the regular Marine League meets, to be held as follows: Preliminaries, Class B, April 24; finals, April 27. Preliminaries Class A (varsity), May 1; finals, May 3. The Southern California preliminaries will be run off May 12.

Torrance is expected to show up well in the Southern Cal events this year. Zamperini is expected to place first in the mile although there are several youths in the district who may crowd him. However, Louie has yet to meet some one who could really give him a race, and if he is pushed a little, he may surprise some of the bookies.

Hubert Luck is running the 440 in great style this year and should place in the S. C. finals. LaVerne Jones, has a good chance to place in the 880. "Bullet" Bob Wertz runs a mean 220. Ishikawa is a crack low hurdler and may place in that event as well as in the pole vault. He may also crack the broad jump record this year.

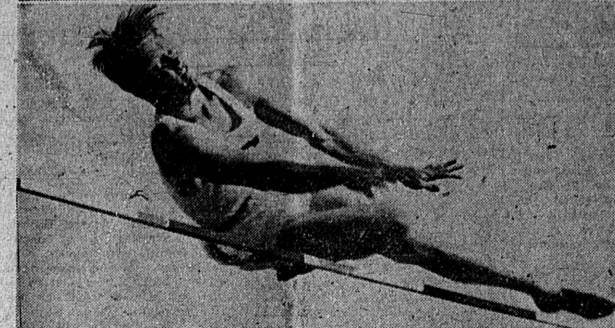

# SCHOOL RECORDS FALL IN MEET HELD HERE FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Tartars Clean Up On Narbonne By 13 Points, North Long Beach Is Outclassed; Zamperini Lowers State Record For the Mile

No less than eight school records were broken last Friday in the triangular meet between the Torrance Tartars, Narbonne Gauchos and North Long Beach, in which Torrance emerged victorious with a total of 65.5-6 points, Narbonne second with 52.3-3 and the Jordan boys with 7.2.

Torrance and Narbonne fought it out all the way with the lads from Lomita holding their own until the meet was well on toward its close.

New school records were set by Torrance contestants in the 100, 220, 440, mile, low hurdles, high jump, broad jump and relay.

"Iron Man" Louis Zamperini cracked the state record for the mile when he finished in the announced time of 4:29.8 flat.

Louie not only lowered the state record for the mile, held by Hooper of Antelope Valley, 4:29.2, but he averaged 87 seconds for the four laps, running the first in 67, time at the half 2:12, three-quarters 3:21 which is within four seconds of his record in the Southern California finals last year, and 4:29 at the tape.

Bunge, Torrance, and Hirata, Narbonne, fought it out for second place, finishing in a dead heat, 200 yards behind the flying Zamperini.

"Bullet" Bob Wertz scampered over the furling route in 22.5, the fastest time that has yet been made in a West Marine event, and faster than the 220 has ever been run by a Torrance athlete, a noteworthy performance since the "Bullet" had just finished third in the 100, won by Hubert Luck in 10 flat, also a new school record.

"Lucky" Luck gets a breather while the 220 is being run and cops the 440 in college time.

La Verne Jones, who has been running the mile, switched to the 880 for this event and placed third. Jones was boxed at the start which robbed him of a good chance to take first, as he was unable to catch up with Schatz after breaking clear. Jones's next start in the half will probably tell a different story as he is capable of taking this event.

Ishikawa came through in the pole vault with a mark of 11 feet, and added two more firsts in the low hurdles and broad jump, setting up a couple more school records in these events.
