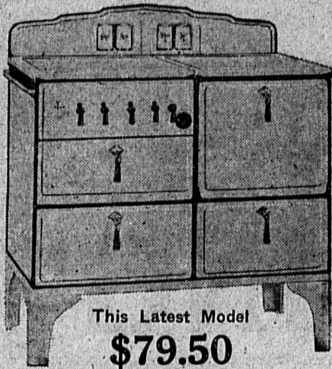

Come Early, Doors Open At 1 P. M.

Wide Variety Planned In Programs

Mrs. Freeman Sum-
marizes Highlights
of Three Day Cook-
in Class.

"There's a new deal for most
everything today, even for pies."
Mrs. Edith Jeffers Freeman,
famed home economist and per-
sonal representative of Julia Lee
Wright, director of the Safeway
and Piggly Wiggly Homemakers'
Bureau, offered this observation as
she made certain all was in readi-
ness on the stage of the Torrance
Theatre for the opening three to-
morrow of the free three-day
course in "Kitcheneering."
She was referring to "tasty
pastry," one of the unusual yet
practical recipes which she will
demonstrate before hundreds of
Torrance homemakers this week.
The well-arranged and complete
program provides for delightful
explanations from the stage of
more than 35 dishes which include
every possible feature of the
Homemakers' menu.
When the final check-up was
made of innumerable details, Mrs.
Freeman found time to discuss
further the myriad of treats which
await local homemakers that have
the good fortune to attend the
"Kitcheneering" courses here.
"I think there is no doubt that
this year's 'Kitcheneering' pro-
gram will be the most complete
and interesting ever presented,"
she commented. "From the
comments that we have heard
during the last few days, public
interest in 'Kitcheneering' is
greater this year than ever before
and we expect the big auditorium
of the Torrance Theatre to be
filled to capacity on each of the
three days of our school."
Pastry Day
Questioned concerning further
details of the program for today
and succeeding sessions of the
cooking school, Mrs. Edith Jeffers
Freeman said that "Kitcheneering"
Wednesday will be largely de-
voted to pastries, homey luncheon
dishes, salads, etc.; cakes and
dishes for entertainment will be
featured on Thursday; on the last
day of the course the program will
include discussions of complete
meals.

She pointed out, however, that
no one general heading could
cover the dishes and subjects to
be featured on any one day.
"If you examine our program
for the first day you can see how
true this is," she explained. "We
will feature such dishes as 'Cheese
Pudding Unique' which can be
served as a main dish, a recipe
for an English Beefsteak pie
which I discovered in Canada and
revamped for modern usage, and
a broiler dinner that every man
is certain to enjoy. One of the
highlights of the first day will be
the explanation and complete
demonstration of a new method of
mixing pastries as perfected in
the testing kitchen of the Home-
makers' Bureau."

Second Day
Evidently the element of mys-
tery is slated to appear in the
second day's program. For ex-
ample, who ever heard of a dish
by the name of "Goop?"
"It's an odd name, to be sure,"
laughed Mrs. Freeman. "But I
can promise that it's just as un-
usual as its name and very deli-
cious. It really is a meal in it-
self, particularly when served with
a platter of salad and possibly a
few slices of garlic bread."
"Another surprise we have plan-
ned for the second day's program
is the 'Mystery' Cake. It is a
decided hit and I know Torrance
homemakers are going to want to
try making this cake when they
learn how comparatively simple it
is. Two of its principal ingredi-
ents would certainly amuse you—
but you're going to have to wait
until the Thursday program to
find out about it."
"And speaking of cakes, the
Homemakers' Bureau has de-
veloped a new and easy method of
mixing sponge and angel food cake
that is certain to interest local
"Kitcheneers."

Complete Meals
The final program of the school,
which will be devoted principally
to complete meals, will also in-
clude every phase of stove usage,
both surface and oven operations
at high and low temperatures.
"During the final program we
are going to demonstrate a won-
derful new recipe for Porto Rican
pot roast with German potato
pancakes—dishes everyone enjoys,"
advised Mrs. Freeman.

"We have dozens of surprises in
store for local homemakers and
I hope that as many as possible
will attend the school on each of
the three days. The Safeway
Stores and Piggly Wiggly Home-
makers' Bureau has devoted
months of effort and research as
a part of the preparation for

"Kitcheneering." We are confident
that it will make homemaking
more pleasant and interesting. I
want to particularly caution "Kitch-
eneers" to bring a pencil and
paper in order that every import-
ant phase of the course will be
retained."

The doors of the Torrance The-
atre will be opened at 1 o'clock in
order to accommodate the crowd
which is expected to fill the large
auditorium to capacity.

The sessions begin promptly at
2 o'clock each day.

How to Remove Soot From Chimney

To rid the chimney of soot, burn
potato peelings, or old zinc tops
from fruit jars, in the stove or
furnace, or get a little scrap zinc
from the tinsmith and sprinkle it
over the hot fire. One or two
ounces of fine flour of sulphur
placed on a bright red fire is also
effective; keep the damper open.

HAWAIIAN SALAD

One pint thinly sliced crisp cab-
bage, one cup pineapple cut in
cubes, one tart red apple, one-
fourth cup preserved ginger cut
in small pieces.

Wash, core and dice the apple,
but do not pare it. Mix ingredi-
ents together, add pineapple salad
dressing. Serve in lettuce cups
with pineapple cream salad dress-
ing.

IRONING "WRINKLE" TO END WRINKLES

Garments with collars, cuffs and
sleeves, such as shirts and dresses,
are hardest to iron. Iron the un-
der side of the collars first, then
the outer side, and those annoying
wrinkles will be on the wrong side
of the collar. Then iron sleeves
and parts that require manipu-
lation of the whole garment. When
the whole garment is done, these
parts may be smoothed out again
with a few light strokes.

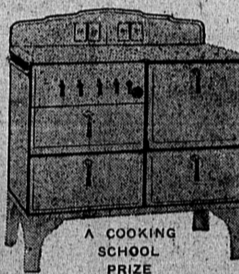

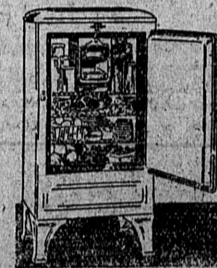
