

### Work Projects Ready to Start Under the SERA

#### County Is Asked to Provide Funds For Insurance, Materials, Etc.

Seventy-two work projects throughout Los Angeles county, uncompleted by the program of the Civil Works Administration, are "ready to go" under the SERA and await agreement by the county to provide workmen's compensation, public liability insurance, rentals and materials. One of these projects is the Lomita sewer, already partially completed. Such was the information conveyed to county officials last week by Frank Y. McLaughlin, newly-appointed director of the State Emergency Relief Administration for the county.

County officials contended that the county does not have the money to take care of the four items which the federal government believes the county should pay for. These four items stand in the way of employment for 2,000 unemployed men in the county on May 1. McLaughlin told the supervisors at the conference in Supervisor Roger Jessup's office. At the end of three hours, no solution had been arrived at. The only possibility was to appeal to R. C. Branich, federal and state unemployment relief administrator for California, and ask him to intercede with Washington officials, county officials concluded.

Everett Mattoon, county counsel and author of the Mattoon Act, cited the decision of the California supreme court that the county was not liable for payment of workmen's compensation insurance while on the county payroll and while employed on public works projects.
