



Big Fireworks Spectacle At The Coliseum

Los Angeles County Council Will Have Patriotic Show July 4

A gigantic fireworks spectacle, daze devil circus stunts and special acts by Kellogg's thoroughbred Arabian horses will feature the second annual Fourth of July show of the Los Angeles County Council of the American Legion, which will be held Wednesday evening, July 4, in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum.

Because of the vast size of the coliseum it has been possible to make the admission prices for children under 12 years as low as 25 cents. Adults will be admitted to the reserved sections for 50 cents and to reserved seats for 75 cents.

More than \$5000 worth of fireworks, many of them wonderful new set pieces never before shown, will be set off at the coliseum.

Johnny Beck, ringmaster of the circus division, will have a number of sensational aerial acts; dancing light-rope walkers; clowns whose comical antics have amused millions and other headliners from the big tops.

All the proceeds of the big fireworks spectacle will be used to help relieve newly disabled veterans of the World War. Arrangements are being made to handle 50,000 spectators for the coming show.

Championship In Track Awarded To The Tartars

In spite of the fact that Narbonne high school won in the finals of the Marine League track season, when they defeated Torrance, 53 1/2 to 52, the Tartars are still No. 1 in the final league ratings, as shown by the lists compiled by Mr. Lopez, in charge of athletics department for the Los Angeles city school board.

Coach Bernard J. Donahue has just received the official rating from this source, which shows that Torrance heads the present league column with eight straight wins for a percentage of 100, which gives the Tartars six points. Narbonne finished in third place with five wins, three defeats, for a percentage of .625, four and one-half points.

In the finals Narbonne by taking first place gets six points making their entire season rating 10.5 points. Torrance placed second for five points, making their season's rating 11 points, consequently the Tartars are still champs in the league. As the schools which win the championship are required to buy their own cups if they want a trophy, Principal A. G. Waidelich is planning to furnish a cup to commemorate the signal success of the Tartar track team this season.

FLUKE HOMER LANDS IN CAR HELPS BELLFLOWER TO 1 RUN

Tommy Bowker's San Pedro Merchants Win Fast Game Sunday; Joe Storti Holds Bellflower to Three Hits; Game Won In Ninth

Manager Tommy Bowker's San Pedro Merchants came through another win over the fast Bellflower team Sunday afternoon, 3-1, to go into a tie for the leadership of the league with the Slav team from San Pedro, the Jadrans, which team will play the Merchants on the Torrance diamond Sunday afternoon, July 1.

Joe Storti pitched a topnotch game for Tommy, letting the Bellflower team down with three hits, one of them a fluke homer which gave them the only run of the game. The homer came in the fourth inning when List hit one to the outfield. The ball came down on a car parked at the edge of the field and went through the top.

There were no ground rules to fit the case, so the score-keeper, credited List with a run, the Chevrolet with an error, and White, right fielder, with a lot of heated language as he struggled to get into the car.

This freak performance made the score, 1-0, in favor of Bellflower. The local boys were hitting Smith, but up to the eighth their hits were scattered. In this inning Dewey Quigley lifted one to the tying run. In the ninth frame Joe Storti fouled out for the second time. White fanned, and two were gone when McCowan spanked one for a single. Olson, Vegher and Tuerk followed suit, with two outs resulting. Bellflower attempted a rally in their half but it died immediately.

Manager Tommy now has one of the fastest semi-pro teams in Southern California, their victory Sunday being their 22nd in 24 starts.

Most of his team is made up of high school boys from Torrance, Gardena and San Pedro, and these lads are plenty good. With a few veterans like Storti, Olson, Vegher and Crook to give them steadiness, this outfit can take on any team in the semi-pro division in this part of the country and give it a ride.

Torrance fans will be able to see them in action a week from Sunday when they play the Jadrans for the leadership of the Southern California Inter-City League, at the municipal ball park. The Jadrans have a following of about 300 fans who go with them wherever they play, and Tommy hopes that Torrance will turn out in equal numbers to match this big delegation and help the team along by giving it their enthusiastic support.

After July 1 the team will play regularly at home, provided the attendance warrants it, so it is up to the fan to show appreciation of a first class team by turning out to the games.
