Chichi, in case you've forgotten, is the material Madame Schiaparelli launched in her midseason collection that looks like crepe tuck at intervals of an eighth of an inch and then "thumbed down" in opposite directions to give each tuck a "this-way and that-way" effect.

Brown chichi with blue cornflowers is another "Schippy" concoction, worn by the Vicomtesse de Lyrot during the Grande Semaine de Paris. It has a low décolletage and a cape of blue rayon threads (long and silky) that is most effective and horridly simple.

If you want to be a bit speedier in the morning, you can wear a brilliant blue taffeta evening gown with a jacket of flame-colored crinkled taffeta with or without "fins" at the back.
