Special Session Of Legislature Urged By Rawls

Local Assemblyman John T. Rawls Would Relieve Unemployed

A special session of the state legislature to authorize funds for the relief of unemployed and to provide means for assisting distressed taxpayers is being urged by State Assemblyman John T. Rawls. A meeting of the 30 Los Angeles county assemblymen and State Senator McKinley with the county board of supervisors has been arranged for August 14 to discuss the necessity of a special session of the state legislature, according to Assemblyman Rawls.

The importance of calling the legislature in special session was further pointed out by Assemblyman Rawls in a recent communication to Governor Frank Merriam and Rawls stated recently while on a visit in Torrance that Governor Merriam had intimated to him that he favored such action.

In a talk last Thursday evening before the unemployed unit at Lomita, Assemblyman Rawls told how SFERA funds would be depleted by September 1 and how serious the unemployment situation would be in Southern California during the winter unless prompt action was taken by the state legislature.

In defense of the state sales tax, Rawls said that the state deficit at the end of this year would be \$100,000,000. He said that the state was repaid a \$30,000,000 increase in the deficit would ensue. During his talk, Rawls told of the difficulties encountered in getting legislation for the construction of state highways. With the help of other Southern California representatives, Rawls was successful in getting the state highway project through the southern portion of Torrance and Lomita.

Assemblyman Rawls, who is a candidate on the Democratic ticket for re-election this fall, is basing his campaign primarily on his record during the past two years. Much of the progressive legislation enacted was sponsored by Assemblyman Rawls. He is particularly interested now in the adoption of a new state constitution which will better fit the needs of the present and future.

Continued from Page 1 could not be arranged. On the other hand, he had before him the valuation of his consulting engineering, the Loveland Engineering Company; the figures, no doubt, the directors of his corporation would have in mind as the worth of their Torrance waterworks. The results of several conferences could not bring us to much accord. We were sounded out on compromising at the midway point of the two valuations, but we felt \$127,000 was the economic limit the city should go. Apparently, Mr. Shotts sensed the seriousness of your council in maintaining that that was your top price, and agreed as far as he was empowered, to accept that offer subject to the approval of the directors of his company.

"Personally, I feel that your council has accomplished a notable worthy task to the best interests of the public. Frankly, it never could have been expected to buy the water system at your own appraisal. And just as frankly I can say that the price is sound and will result in a saving of time, money and general benefit to your city.

"Our findings have been that the waterworks is not a junk system by any means. It is true there are some 35,000 feet of old riveted steel lines which must be replaced—but the city is paying little or nothing for them. This purchase is in reality an investment in the cast iron pipe at a price reasonably reduced to allow for "condition per cent," with due regard for depreciation, adequacy and adaptability.

"Investigations by us have revealed that it is more economical to buy at this price than to attempt to install a new system. The system is not particularly undepreciated to the city's future plans. Last but not least, the fact cannot be lost sight of that paralleling another system is attended by plenty of grief and unexpected expense and delay. I have no doubt but that the city would eventually win out. A fair settlement has forestalled this eventuality to the

benefit of both parties. Undoubtedly, the foresight of Mr. Shotts on this point has led him to recommend to his associates the acceptance of the city's offer of \$127,000 together with some minor liabilities the city is to assume but without immediate cash outlay.

"From personal experience in going through similar cases of cities taking over the utility companies, relatively speaking, I can say that the Torrance representative drove a good bargain, not confictory in any sense, but fair, square and logical, which, undoubtedly, should be gratifying to the citizens who have long looked forward to owning their own waterworks; and one, which when judiciously improved and managed and made free of excessive losses, will provide much cheaper water and become self-liquidating.

"In closing, may I say I sincerely hope you feel the same sense of pride that I do in the part we have played in arriving at a fair and acceptable figure for the waterworks.
