Redondo Beach Attorney Outlines Plans For Justice Court In New Township

Harry Polglase, of Redondo Beach and candidate for justice of the peace in the new Inglewood township embracing Torrance and Lomita, was a visitor in Torrance recently. Mr. Polglase received his legal education at U. S. C. and has been practicing law since 1914. He was city clerk of Redondo Beach six years, justice of the peace of Redondo township two years, city attorney of Redondo Beach three years, and maintains a law office in Redondo Beach, where he resides.

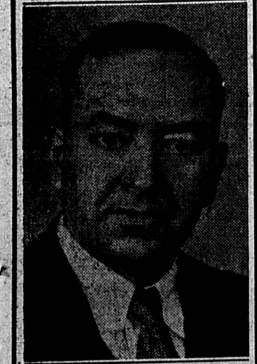
In commenting upon the consolidation of the smaller townships after January 1, Mr. Polglase stated that the justice of the peace has the power to try cases in any part of the township where he sees fit; and if elected, he promises to try all cases accruing in Torrance, Lomita, La Rambla and vicinity at Torrance. Likewise, all cases accruing in Inglewood, Lennox, Hawthorne and vicinity will be tried at Inglewood; all cases accruing in Redondo Beach, Hermosa Beach, Manhattan Beach, El Segundo and vicinity at Redondo Beach; and all cases accruing in Gardena and vicinity at Gardena.

Mr. Polglase also pledges himself, if elected: "To devote his full time to the duties of the office; to be governed by no clique, faction or persons, and to unequivocally render equal justice to all, regardless of whom they may be or in what part of the township they reside."

Judge Green Is Torrance Visitor

Judge Lucius P. Green, the only candidate for office 19, superior court, endorsed by the Los Angeles County Bar Association for judicial ability, was a visitor in Torrance this week in connection with the active campaign he is conducting throughout the county.

Judge Green has been in public service for a number of years and is being supported by many groups of civic leaders and church workers who declare that his record shows him to possess sound American ideals and great personal integrity.

He was elected to the Los Angeles municipal court in 1931. Before that he was for seven years assistant city attorney of Los Angeles in charge of litigation, twice in that time successfully representing Los Angeles in the United States supreme court. Also in that capacity he personally directed the work of restoration and settlement of claims following the St. Francis dam disaster and did not allow a claimant to receive more than 4000 dollars. He has rebuilt and nearly 4000 claims for life, or loss and property damage were settled, with only one case tried by the courts.

A native son, Judge Green is a graduate of Stanford and has had more than 23 years of practice before the California Bar.
