**Drought Relief Loans Available To Poultrymen**

Cash for Purchase of Supplies May be OBTAINED from SERA

Poultrymen, beekeepers, and farmers in the county are receiving drought relief loans from the Los Angeles SERA headquarters, 741 South Flower street, it was announced by SERA officials.

Those asking for aid have received the loans within five to 10 days from the time applications are made according to C. Newton Graves, SERA official in charge of the emergency crop loan section of the Farm Credit Administration office.

This was made possible through the experience gained by the administration in relieving distress in more seriously affected drought areas, the official explained.

Poultrymen have been hit the hardest by the drought in this county, according to the official. Since the opening of the feed loan office here, 33 poultrymen borrowed \$1961, enough to sustain approximately 40,000 members of the feathered tribe for one month. Eight dairymen received an advance for the month of \$1734.

Loans to poultry and dairymen are advanced on a monthly basis over the period of need estimated by the FCA to be five months, it was explained.

Beekeepers borrowed 21,800 pounds of sugar to furnish approximately 13,000,000 bees with syrup to fill the place of nectar from blossoms blighted by the drought in the county.

This supply covers a three-week period, according to the official.

A decided increase in applications is expected as fall pastures fade and food reserves are exhausted. Many distressed poultry and dairymen who were unable to furnish non-disturbance agreements from mortgage and lienholders are also expected to make applications for these advances.

Where borrowers show bad faith, loan advances may be stopped, criminal prosecution is possible, and the status of the mortgage-holder is protected, the official said.

Security for the feed loans consists of the borrower's promissory note payable with 5 1/2 per cent interest at maturity, November 1, 1935, according to the official.

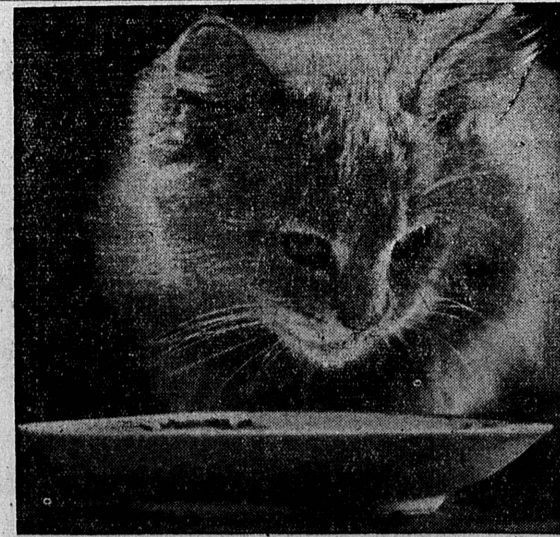
