Sausage Popular In Summer Season

These days, when appetites so often lag behind, sausage is a favorite, not only because it can be cooked quickly, but also because its spicy flavor revives appetites when nothing else will.

There need be no monotony in the ways of preparing sausage; it makes no difference how often it is used, for it combines well with practically any vegetable or fruit. "Here are a few of the most popular combinations," says Inez S. Willson, home economist.

- 1. Sausage patties served on rings of fried pineapple.
2. Sausage links baked with apples.
3. Fried sausage and apple rings.
4. Sausage and fried bananas.
5. Mixed grill of broiled sausage, tomatoes, and partially cooked potatoes or sweet potatoes.
6. Sausage and omelet or scrambled eggs.
7. Sausage and waffles.
8. Sausage and cold potato salad.

In cooking this delicious sausage, it is a wise precaution to prick them several times with a sharp-tined fork. This prevents bursting.
