1 tablespoon lard
4 tart apples
1 cup cider
Whole cloves
Flour
Salt
Pepper
Have the chops cut about 3/4 inch thick. Season with salt and pepper, dredge with flour and brown on both sides in hot lard. Core the apples and slice into a baking dish. Lay chops on the apple slices and pour over them the cider in which the cloves have been heated and removed. Cover and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) until the apples are tender and the chops are done.
