Interesting Program Begins Year's Activity

"Federation" was the subject chosen by Mrs. Lee Austin, vice president of the Los Angeles Federation of Woman's Clubs, when she addressed the local club at their first meeting of the year in Torrance, Woman's Club clubhouse, 1422 Engracia avenue, Wednesday. Mrs. Austin stated that each year California federation chooses a working theme—this year it is, "Our Federation." In 1868, she said, the first Woman's club was organized in Boston. It was known as the New England Woman's Club. Woman's clubs operated for 21 years on strictly cultural lines. In 1889 there were 87 Woman's clubs in the United States. One year later a federation was organized and 60 club joined. Federation, she stated, is the tie that binds. By working together woman's clubs have become the tower of strength in their communities.

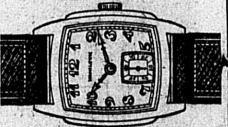
