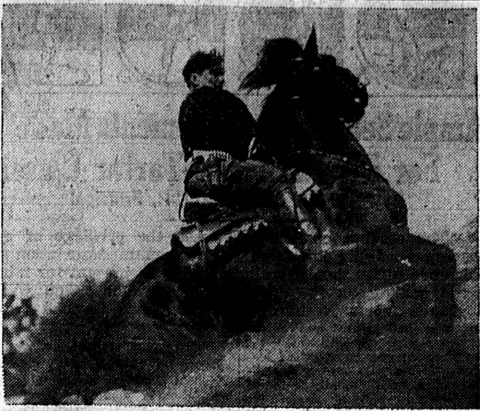


GEORGE GOES INTO ACTION
