

TARTARS SMACK DOWN STOUT LEUZINGER OLYMPICS FRIDAY

Three Touchdowns, Two Conversions, Give Torrance Team Safe Lead; Hayward, Fullback, Makes Lone Score For Hawthorne; Tartars Rest This Week

Torrance Tartars will take a lay-off this week, after polishing off three of the five teams in the Marine League. Friday's victory over the stout Leuzinger team, 20-6, put them indisputably at the top of the percentage column, a position they hope to maintain November 2 when they meet Ben Comrada's Narbonne Gauchos in the final game of the league season.

While Leuzinger disputed the field every inch of the way until the final run, they were no match for the smooth-running Tartar outfit which made consistent gains every time the ball was in their possession and elicited over three touchdowns and two conversions.

The game was marred by a number of fumbles due to the slippery condition of the ball. Leuzinger's field had not dried out after the heavy rains of the preceding days and several long runs were cut short when the Torrance ball packer slipped in the mud and fell sprawling.

Hayward, Leuzinger fullback, was the mainstay of his team. He was in every play and accounted for their only touchdown in the final moments of the last quarter. Arico, speedy quarterback, found himself smothered under the Tartar defense and failed to make any spectacular gains.

Adzovich, McFadden and Wertz did the scoring for Torrance. Watson kicked one goal and looked good on this feature of the game, although his punting in the game was still a little bit on the off side, short and low. Adzovich added the other point.

Coach Donahue made numerous substitutions after the Tartars had the game won, 13-0, in the third quarter, and every man sent in clicked perfectly. Given a dry field, the score could easily have been twice 20, but the wet, slippery sod hampered both teams.

The Tartars functioned like a machine all the time. Straight football was the rule of the afternoon, with little passing attempted. Torrance's one pass in the third quarter was incomplete, the ball from Watson to Paxman was high and slipped out of Paxman's hands. A sure touchdown from this play would have resulted as Pax was waiting a yard from the goal.

A 15-yard penalty on Torrance put the ball back nearly to the center of the field, but the Tartars marched up to the goal line and on first down had six inches to go for the touchdown.

On the strength of their showing in the three games, the Narbonne name, November 2, a prime favorite to take the title for the first time since the organization of the Marine League, now divided into the Marine and Pacific Leagues.

Winner of the Marine championship will meet the winner of Pacific at the conclusion of the regular schedule. South Gate, which has won three and lost no games this season, looks to be the Tartar opponent.

The Narbonne game, however, will be no set-up. Willy Ben Comrada can always be depended upon to pull the white rabbit out of the hat at some unexpected moment, and the Gaucho-Tartar game may prove to be one of those phenomenal upsets which have been chronicled in football history this season.

The Gauchos in the Coliseum look upon their coach as the man who invented football, and will fight to the last ditch for Ben and dear old Narbonne.


And this goes for the Torrance alumni and the general football public also. There are always some who can make a game their excuse to work off some private grudges, but happily they are few.

Trojans Leave Tonight For Annual Battle With Stanford

LOS ANGELES.—Still carrying the hopes of thousands of Southland fans despite their setbacks of the past three weeks, the Trojans of University of Southern California will entrain tonight for Palo Alto where on Saturday they will resume their long-standing rivalry with Stanford's Indians.

Approximately 40 men are slated to make the trip. They will spend the day before the game at the secluded Castlewood Country Club, which is located 25 miles inland from Palo Alto, and a final light warmup on the club course Friday afternoon will complete their preparations for the battle.

Despite defeats by Washington State and Pittsburg and the 4-0 record of S. C.'s weakest eleven of recent years, but in spite of the overwhelming odds against Troy, Southland followers believe that the local boys can make it a battle.

Improvement in Trojan play has been noted during the past week and the weakness in the fundamentals of blocking, charging and tackling is being gradually overcome, as the result of the steady drill on these phases of the game by Coach Howard Jones and his assistants. Just what changes, if any, are being made in the S. C. style of play for the Stanford game will not be revealed until the battle begins Saturday, as the gates of Bovard field, Troy's practice grounds, are being kept tightly locked during this week's workouts.

Southern California-Stanford football rivalry, which dates back to 1905, has produced some of the game's greatest thrillers. The Trojans have a decided edge in the won and lost column, although Stanford, with three victories and a tie out of the nine games played during the Jones regime at Troy has the best record of any Pacific Coast Conference institution against S. C.'s "Head Men." Since the Trojans and Indians began their gridiron feud 29 years ago, they have played 15 games, with Southern California victorious in ten, Stanford in four and one tie.

Those who saw the last half of the game will remember that it did get results.

Javens plays a real brand of ball, a brand that any coach would be proud to have on his team, his blocking and tackling is outstanding and when he carries the ball it is usually for a gain. Javens is considered one of the best pass receivers in southland prep football.

If the following Torrance men are not on the All-Marine league team this year there is something wrong—Roger McGinnis, tackle; Chuck Smith, guard; Jim Grubbs, center; Ted Adzovich, fullback; and Jack Javens, halfback. Several other members of the team should be considered when the officials of the league meet to pick the mythical team. They are—Johnny McFadden, end; Gar Johnson, end; Hal Smith, quarterback and Harold Watson, halfback fullback.
