

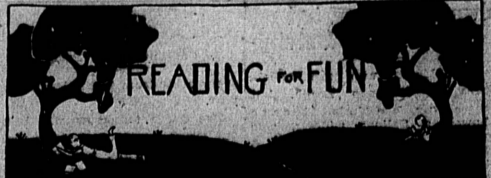

for justice of the peace of the new township at the final election next Tuesday, Judge Carroll has been honored by being made vice president of the Farmers and Merchants Bank at Gardena. He has been content for this institution throughout its reorganization period, and his services in this behalf were rewarded by his election to this position of trust. It was largely under his supervision and direction that a plan of reorganization was worked out for this bank, which on October 15 reopened for business without restriction, thereby releasing nearly \$200,000 in deposits, which had been tied up since March of last year. This bank was the first state bank to reopen with federal aid furnished through the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, and its depositors are now insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation of Washington, D. C.
