Trucks Must Renew Licenses By Dec. 15

SACRAMENTO.—Trucks engaged in hauling for hire operations must renew their transportation licenses by December 15 or be subject to a penalty, the state board of equalization announced today.

Application for renewal of licenses will be available at all board offices on November 15 and renewal blanks will be mailed to operators by December 1.

An annual fee of \$15 is charged for the privilege of hauling for hire by motor vehicle, the board explained. A penalty of \$10 additional is attached if the renewal is not received by December 15.

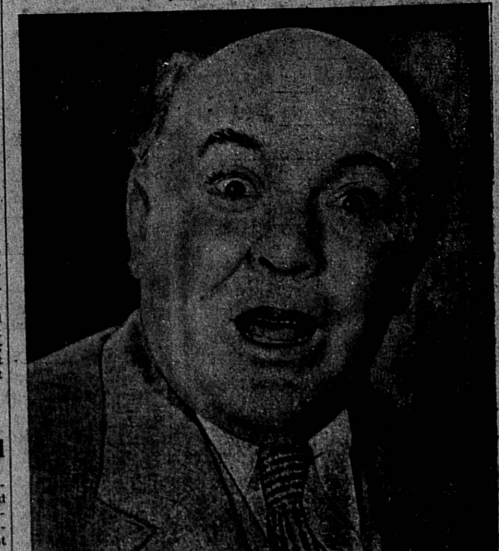
