First of the American continent to leave for the scene of the international chess tournament to be held in Mexico City the first week of December, Reuben Fine, champion of the Marshall Chess Club and the holder of the Western Chess Association title, mailed two weeks ago for Vera Cruz on board the steamship Orizaba of the Ward line. The young New Yorker, who holds a degree of Master of Arts from the College of the City of New York, will be one of a dozen entrants in the competition announced by Capt. Jose J. Aranza, the Mexican champion, and one of the leading exponents of the game in that country.

Isaac Kashdan was successful in winning the exhibition game with Samuel Reshevsky at New Bedford and, thanks to his precise handling of the ending, defeated the one-time boy marvel with the black pieces in a Queen's Gambit Declined after 57 moves. The game lasted over six hours and attracted an attendance of 200 persons. Mayor Ashley was among those who greeted the young masters.

If you are one of those people who think there is no excitement in chess, then examine this lively game from the Bad Nendorf tournament between the two "brack" players of Sweden.
