Car Owners Must Have Clearance For New License

Assessor's Stamp on Reverse of White Slip or No Plates

Thousands of California car owners will be temporarily disappointed when the time arrives to secure 1935 license plates. All because, despite warnings from the motor vehicle department, they have failed to call at the county tax assessor's office to secure the stamp on the back of the white certificate of registration which means that personal property taxes have been paid.

All certificates of registration issued in 1934 must include verification that taxes are satisfied before 1935 license plates can be issued, according to Russell Bevans, director of the division of registration.

Already transfers of ownership have been delayed at cost of time and trouble both to the car owner and the department because this necessary detail has been overlooked, according to Mr. Bevans. Part of this difficulty is laid to the fact that the law is a new one, having become effective March 5, 1934, and marks a departure from the routine formerly followed in renewing California registrations.

Attention also is being called to the fact that the Los Angeles branch of the motor vehicle department is now located at 5500 South Hope street, where the needs of the public can be met much more quickly and efficiently than in the old quarters on Grand avenue. As an added convenience, branch offices also are located at 1445 North Vine street, Hollywood; 37 South Lake avenue, Pasadena; and 855 Pacific avenue, Long Beach.

Renewal of registration will begin, as in former years, on January second.

Increased Interest Noted At Democratic Club Headquarters

Over 75 persons attended the regular weekly meeting of the Torrance Democratic Club, held Tuesday evening at the club's new headquarters at 1331 E. Prado, and heard an inspirational message from Judge Patterson of San Pedro, who was the principal speaker of the evening.

It is interesting and remarkable to note, according to President Ryan, the increased interest in the activities of the club, inasmuch as meetings are now marked by larger attendance than before election. Club headquarters have been arranged so as to provide a pleasant reception and lounging room, and also an assembly room with large seating capacity. There will soon be installed a circulating library of books of current interest for the use of this community, and prominent speakers will be provided on meeting nights to discuss educational and timely subjects.

At the meeting Tuesday evening, Mr. H. C. Linds was elected as manager of the headquarters, and he emphasized the fact that everybody in Torrance and vicinity was welcome at all times.

Nine Men Arrested For Violation of Fish, Game Law

Five Japanese pleaded guilty in the Lomita township justice court this week to violation of the fish and game code, in relation to the taking of undersized abalone, and received fines of \$50 or 25 days in the county jail, half of which was suspended for two years on condition that they do not repeat the offense. Haruo and Yoshiharu Murakami were given until Friday to raise the balance of the fine. Novaru Hayataku, Mitsuo Miyamoto and Sam Ohira paid.

Joe Yourato, Bert Rays, Gayino Loranana, and James Baldaria, pleaded guilty to a similar charge and also to the charge of removing abalone from the shell below the high tide mark. They were fined \$50 or 25 days each on each count, half of the amount being suspended for two years conditionally. Yourato paid, the others were remanded to the county jail.

Hazlit Changes Plea Asks For Probation

R. A. Hazlit, Burbank resident who is charged with driving while intoxicated in Torrance last October 1, entered a plea of guilty in Los Angeles superior court last week, and asked for probation. He had previously pleaded not guilty to the charges.

Acting on his application for probation, the judge on November 28, in department 44 of superior court, Hazlit was allowed to remain on \$500 bond which he posted several weeks ago.
