Meats Can Make Being Hostess a Real Pleasure

Cooler days make entertaining a pleasure. Why not set aside one day of each week as guest day, and invite one or two friends to dinner?

If entertaining is to be the real pleasure that it should, the meal must be easily prepared, easily served, and one which keeps within the budget, too.

Choose Meat With Care The meat dish, since it forms the main dish of the meal, must be chosen with special care. A roast is always a good choice, but be sure to use every precaution to make it easily carved. Instead of leaving the bones in a shoulder of lamb and so making it difficult to carve, have it boned at the market, and stuff the cavity with your favorite dressing. Then it can be sliced down through, and all the difficult intricacies of carving are eliminated.

Meat Loaf a Good Choice A meat loaf is delicious for the informal dinner, and it is so easily sliced and served. If you want a very special meat loaf, bake it in a ring mold. Then file the center with rice or creamed potatoes, decorate with parsley and you have not only a good, but a good-looking dish. A two-ounce meat loaf is a very special way of preparing the popular loaf.

Two-Tone Meat Loaf 1 pound ground veal 1 pound ground ham 1 cup bread crumbs 2 eggs, slightly beaten 1 pint milk, chopped 2 onions, chopped 6 slices bacon Salt and pepper

Combine the veal and half the other ingredients; the bread crumbs, pimiento, onion, egg and seasoning. Separately combine the other half of the ingredients with the ground ham. Line a loaf pan with bacon, pack in the ham mixture, and press it into a level mass. On top of it pack the veal mixture and over all place the remaining strips of bacon. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for about one and a half hours.

A meat loaf is still easier to serve if it is baked in individual muffin tins or custard cups. These individual loaves may be turned out onto a large platter, and garnished with tomato slices and parsley.

Individual Swiss Steak Swiss steak is always a good choice for the informal guest dinner. The steak may be cut into individual portions before cooking in order to facilitate serving at the table.

Improvement of Cabrillo Avenue Meets More Delay

Hopes of the city council to be able to use a portion of Torrance's share of the state gasoline tax money in the improvement of Cabrillo avenue, were dashed this week by receipt of a letter from the state highway department, which stated that under the present law Cabrillo avenue could not be included in the project as it is not officially designated as a state highway.

The council had hoped to improve this avenue which is one of the main highways in the downtown district, and is at present in need of more paving and improvement to make it safe and satisfactory for motorists, instead of putting the money into some outlying highway which does not carry much traffic. Last year the city was forced to use its gasoline tax money in the improvement of Strawberry avenue in the McDonough tract, which, while in need of improvement, is not as important to the community as Cabrillo avenue, but since it had been designated as a secondary state highway, offered the only place to the city for use of the funds.

In January when the new legislature meets, it is expected that some changes will be made in the law which will enable this city to proceed with the desired project.
