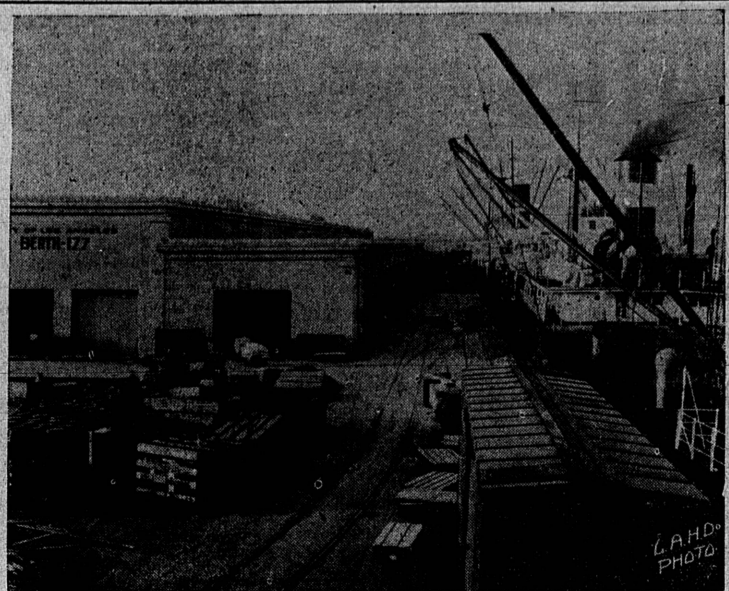


Mrs. L. Nohrnberg Passes Away Monday

Business Is Booming At McCormick Berth

Congestion of docks at Los Angeles harbor, due to heavy increases in commerce, will result in early construction of a \$55,000 extension of the berthing facilities occupied by McCormick Steamship Company, at Berths 177-179, harbor department officials announced.

Bids for building the new berth will be opened December 12 at the Los Angeles city hall. It is expected the addition will be completed soon after the first of the year. "Business of this company has increased so rapidly that it is absolutely imperative that we do something to relieve the congested condition at their docks," declared E. J. Aman, president of the harbor board. "In spite of the depression, McCormick went out into all parts of the world for commerce. The result has been an ever increasing tonnage passing over their docks, until today they lack room in which to handle their cargo. Naturally, the harbor department will benefit from the new construction in increased revenue."

Mr. Aman then added, "McCormick is not the only shipper at the harbor showing increased tonnage. Many other berths today are operating at capacity limits, and the data is not far distant when, even with the gigantic terminal facilities we possess, we shall be faced with a problem of relieving congestion on many other docks. Added to this is the problem of finding berthing facilities for at least half-dozen additional shipping lines which plan regular services to this port at an early date."
