

Torrance Hunters Gun For Goats On San Clemente Isl.

Party of Six Nimrods Off Saturday Night For Trip Out to Sea

B. J. Scott, E. H. DeBra, Joe Webb, William Diesel, Ray Coffin and Norman Nelson will leave Saturday night at 9 o'clock for a hunting trip to San Clemente Island, 40 miles off the coast. They will board a sea-going tug, captained by Mr. Michaels, of Pasadena, who owns the commercial hunting privileges on the island, and expect to arrive at San Clemente about dawn on Sunday.

The day will be spent pursuing the wild goats which scampers over the wild terrain of the island, or in hunting quail, the only other game worth hunting there. Return to the mainland will be made Sunday evening.

The goats on the island, numbering now some 25,000, according to estimate, are the descendants of domesticated animals left there many years ago. During the heyday of travel to California by sea, from 1840 to about 1865, numerous vessels were wrecked on San Clemente, and as it is of a barren, rugged character, skippers of other vessels conceived the idea of providing for castaways by landing goats, chickens, pigs and other livestock on the island. Of the varieties landed, only the goats were able to make a living and survive. The present stock has accommodated itself to the conditions, and now the goats bear very little resemblance to their timid, domesticated forefathers. They are heavier in body, short of leg, long of horn, and their hoofs are large and tough to withstand the shocks of jumping from crag to crag. In color they are dark brown on back and side, shading to a lighter color underneath. They have a plentiful growth of bangs and a substantial beard. The meat is very rich, mild in flavor like beef, and very palatable.

All the hunters are hoping to come back with a pair of two, and perhaps a pair of quail besides. Just how the island became stocked with quail is a mystery, as the distance is too great for such a bird to fly, and there is no record of their having been planted there by man.

According to Mr. Scott, who has made similar trips to San Clemente on other occasions, there is nothing on the island to attract anyone but hunters after goat meat. There is no tillable soil, nothing grows but cactus and a few shrubs and sparse coarse vegetation. There are plenty of springs, but the water is cut up by numerous canyons, of a unique and dangerous character. One hunter who attempted to explore such a canyon in recent years lost his life when a shelf crumbled under his weight and let him fall to the rocks below. San Clemente is owned by the federal government, but apparently is attached to no California county, as was shown by the incident above referred to. No inquest or formal inquiry could be made into the circumstances of the hunter's death because there were no authorities to take the responsibility.

Dr. S. J. Barker Will Speak to Young People At Central Church

HINTS FOR MOTORISTS

(The Herald today presents another group of an instructive series of questions and answers related to various phases of motor vehicle ownership and operation in California. Authority for the answers is Ivan Kelso, General Counsel, Automobile Club of Southern California.)

Question—What is the penalty prescribed for driving during the period for which an operator's license has been suspended?
Answer—A fine not to exceed \$1000 or imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed one year or both.

Question—Is it permissible to drive in the center lane of a three lane highway when there is no other traffic in the immediate vicinity?
Answer—Unless otherwise directed by signs, or traffic officers, under unusual conditions, a vehicle may be driven in the center lane of such a highway only for the purpose of overtaking and passing another vehicle, or in preparation for a left turn. When there is no other traffic on the highway the motorist must drive in the right hand lane.

Question—When driving a car which is equipped with a stop light in good operation is it unlawful to suddenly decrease speed or come to a stop without giving an arm signal?
Answer—The Vehicle Act requires only that a stop light device in order to qualify for the approval of the Division of Motor Vehicles shall give a stop signal plainly visible for a distance of 100 feet to the rear. Undoubtedly the stop lights which come as factory equipment on practically all cars at the present time do meet these requirements. Nevertheless for some years the Division of Motor Vehicle has declined to test or give official approval to the various forms of stop lights probably because of their simplicity.

Since, however, Section 131 of the Vehicle Act requires that on stopping a signal to be given either by hand or by means of a mechanical or electrical device which has been approved by the division of motor vehicles, and since there are few if any stop lights in operation which have received such official approval, it is hardly possible to comply with the law otherwise than by giving the hand signal. The stop light may be working but if the question should arise it could not be shown that it had received approval and would probably not be recognized in court as a legal substitute for the hand signal.
