## School Adjustments Is Topic of Address Here

A study of school adjustments, presented by Mrs. Oda Vans, principal of the Fern avenue school; at a meeting of the Fern Avenue Parent Teachers Association on Tuesday, November 27, proved to be vitally interesting to all who attended, and will be of interest to mothers in general who have children of school age.

Mrs. Vans said: "School failures have been looked upon as disagreeable or as a label of inferiority. When a child fails in school subjects under such conditions, it does something to him that may leave a lasting impression, it crushes his spirit and makes him doubtful of his own ability."  
"The Los Angeles school district has made a thorough study of school failures during the past few years. In 1927, over eight per cent of all school children failed to make their grade and over half of these were in the first two grades. In 1928 more than nine per cent failed and again over half were in the two lower grades. Similar studies were being made throughout the country and the same problem was discovered—in the lower grades. Too many children were failing in primary reading. Either the standards were too high or the children were not ready for reading."

"After another study of the children who failed to learn to read, certain conclusions were made. It has always been assumed that all children should learn to read when they reach the age of six years, yet they get their teeth at different ages and learn to walk at different stages of development. It does not necessarily mean that a child is mentally inferior if he develops slower than another child. One child is able to make an adjustment to classroom situations and learn to read at five and one-half years of age and another normal child may not be ready until seven years of age or until he has made certain adjustments that he has not had the opportunity to make sooner because of slower physical development, lack of social contacts, or a different language in the home."

"Reading must come as a natural interest after other normal growths, including emotional balance, physical well being and a background of childhood experiences."  
"Three years ago the Los Angeles schools made provision for the children who had not made these adjustments in kindergarten by providing classes for transition B1 pupils. In these classes the children are allowed to continue their normal growth and development with a broadened kindergarten program, but with more contacts with books and an interest in things and people grows so does the desire to read come naturally without force."  
"After the classes for transition B1 pupils had been in progress in some of the schools for less than two years, the per cent of failures in all grades decreased to seven and one-half per cent. The transition class is for six-year-old children who are not ready to learn reading, those who cannot apply themselves to books without difficulty."

"It is not better that children learn to make adjustments to their surroundings and that they be allowed to grow naturally than that they be allowed to experience failure as such? A few of our children are going to be asked to make certain adjustments in other grades for some have not made them earlier and are working in groups too far advanced for them. This, too, can discourage children and cause them to ques-

tion their own ability whereas they will do much better if they are not forced ahead and can work for standards not too advanced but still with children near their own ages."  
"In making these adjustments we are asking your help. We are asking you to encourage the children and to reassure them that a class adjustment is not a punishment nor something to fear. These children will not be looked upon with disfavor nor made to repeat work they have learned. They will be helped from where they really are to where they supposed they were, which in progress, not retardation."

"There are certain other adjustments where a change in classification is not advisable so we organized a remedial reading program about which some have already inquired. Standardized reading tests, two in many cases, have been given to all children during the past couple weeks. The whole school above the second grade has been reclassified according to ability in reading and for one period a day, when all groups will work on reading, the children will report to a special class and work with children of their own ability. The lower groups will be very small and give time for much individual help and the upper groups will have enriched reading programs with individualized information, including travel and science, study of literature and reading for pleasure."  
"We are hopeful that these adjustments will prove beneficial to all children and that they will prevent school failures in the future."

In addition to Mrs. Vans' address, the members heard C. E. McNew of the Torrance playground, who told of the opportunities for instruction and play at the recreation centers. Miss Mowry's B1 class presented a little play, "Pilgrims and Indians." Miss Thomas and Mrs. Botkin's rooms were awarded prizes for having the greatest number of mothers present. Refreshments were served at the close of the meeting.
