City Property to Be Used For Revolver Range

Pit Adjoining the Brick Yard Will Furnish Ideal Site

Plans to utilize the city property adjoining the Torrance Brick Company's plant south of Plaza del Amo, have been adopted by the Revolver and Rifle Association of Torrance, and the members of the organization will within a short time move from their present range on Columbia Steel property to the new site.

The new range will be an improvement in that it affords complete safety, so far as possible stray bullets are concerned, since it is located in a pit about 30 feet deep.

The Columbia Steel range, while very satisfactory, is subject to possible accidental damage to life and property because it is located in a shallow gully, with a wide field north of the target backdrop, over which cattle are grazed and children and grown-ups wander at will. A stray bullet, missing the backdrop, could very easily cause injury to persons or livestock. Since the city has a property which is much more suitable for the purpose, Councilman W. H. Stanger, a member of the association, was delegated to contact other councilmen for permission to use the site.

The new site, being larger, will accommodate not only 25-yard range for rapid revolver fire, 50-yard range for slow fire, but also a 100-yard range for small caliber rifle practice.

Due to the ground level off and a shack will be built for shelter to members who are waiting their turns at practice. Cars will be parked at the street level, with a stairway built leading down into the range, so that it will not be necessary to drive into the pit.

The new move, which was announced officially at the meeting of the Association Tuesday night, has aroused great interest not only among the present members but from parties outside of Torrance who would like to join to get the benefit of practice on a safe, suitable range.

Western Cage Coach Uses His Own Style

Basketball Mentor At B. Y. U. Sets Pace For Nation

 SALT LAKE CITY, Utah. (U.P.)—A revolutionary style of basketball is sweeping out of the Rocky Mountains. It threatens to change the world-wide sport as coaches see their teams go down to defeat before it—and start to teach it.

G. Ott Romney of Brigham Young University, Provo, Utah, developed it. He teaches his players a system based on:

"Score more points than the other fellow."

It results in slashing action that lifts spectators farther out of their seats than does formal, diagrammed play.

Romney-coached teams have beaten A. A. U. champions, topped Eastern clubs. He developed three players who were unanimously All-American selections despite the handicap of small school obscurity.

Man-to-Man Style

The long-jawed Utah mentor coaches a man-to-man style of play—with variations. Offense is the essence of his system.

He reasons his team can't be defeated if his range, lightning-fast players are continually dropping the ball through the basket. Which they do most of the time; their scoring average of more than 50 points per game against all competition is evidence.

Romney first gained national prominence when he unleashed his "Golden Bobcats" from Montana State that ruled the Rocky Mountain Conference for two years before his departure to Brigham Young in 1929 and a year more under his assistant, Schubert Dyche, who succeeded him.

During the team's reign, the usual season scoring spree was more than 1000 points. The conference honor team was the regular Montana starting lineup. Romney's winning average over a six-year period was .650.

In 1932, after a building up program, Romney had another winning team. The club astonished court fans with their hell-for-leather play.
