PARIS (U.P.)—Anny Blatt has weathered the Depression storm and come through "smiling." She contends that any land can produce cheap merchandise, but that the WORLD looks to PARIS for luxury, and above all for IDEAS.

This explains why she has designed a series of children's frocks from three to fourteen—concocted a new perfume called "Parfums d'Anny," just for good luck.

The perfume is for sports, refreshing and refined yet with a sort of woody tang that is delightful. Madame Blatt has a wide range of artificial silk yarns that look like wool—wool yarns with a glint of cellophane—and yarns the nature of whose mixture she does not divulge.

Aid last, but most important, the turkey dinner, which, of course, was served at noon. The dinner was prepared by Mrs.

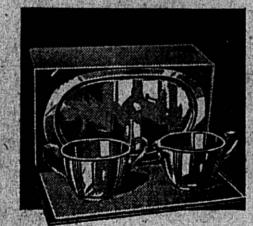
ATTEND PEACE LECTURE
