

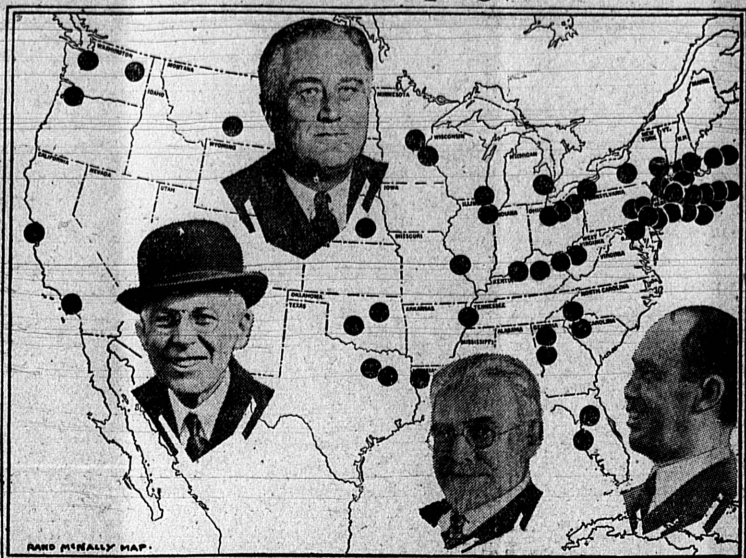
FATHER OF LOMITA DENTIST PASSES AWAY

President's National Campaigners on "Polio"



When President Roosevelt recently consented to "lend" his 53rd birthday anniversary on Jan. 30, 1935, to a nation-wide ball, proceeds of which will be used to fight infantile paralysis, again the country's attention was focused on the seriousness of the disease.

The map above shows the number of orthopedic hospitals in the United States recognized by the American Medical Association, and their location. These 49 today carry the load in giving treatment to the 200,000 persons in the country who bear the

handicaps of the disease. Seventy cents of every dollar raised this year will go to aid these victims in communities raising the money. The other 30 cents will be turned over to the President's Birthday Ball Commission for infantile Paralysis Research headed by Col. Henry L. Doherty (lower center) of New York and Miami, who was chairman of the 1934 Birthday Ball for the President and was recently appointed to serve in the same capacity in 1935.

Vice-chairman is Jeremiah Mibbank (lower right) of New

York, treasurer and trustee of the Institute for the Crippled and Disabled and a noted philanthropist. Paul de Kruff, formerly a bacteriologist at Rockefeller Institute and famous as an author, will be secretary, while Edward S. Harkness (lower left), a trustee of the Presbyterian Hospital and of the Metropolitan Museum of New York, will be the treasurer.

Income Blanks Ready to Be Mailed Today

All Persons of Sufficient Income Must File Before March 15

John P. Carter, collector of internal revenue, has received a telegram from the bureau in Washington to release income tax forms for 1934 on January 10. Collector Carter's force is busily engaged in preparing 250,000 income tax blanks for mailing on that date. Forms may be had at the collector's office, 939 South Broadway, Los Angeles, or at any branch office on and after January 10.

Income tax returns must be filed by every person who had a gross income of \$500.00 regardless of net income, or who had a net income of \$1000.00 or more if single, or \$2500.00 or more, if married.

The publicity section of the Revenue Act of 1934 makes it necessary to file a separate statement with the return this year for public inspection. Failure to file this additional statement on Form 10994 incurs a penalty of \$5.00 in every case, whether or not any tax is due.

The normal tax is 4% of all income over exemptions and the surtax attaches to all income over \$4000.00. There is allowed a carried income deduction of 10% of net income not over \$1,000.00. All returns for 1934 must be filed on or before March 15, 1935, to avoid 25% penalty. Returns may be filed in the collector's office at 939 South Broadway, Los Angeles, or at any branch office.

Problem No. 107 By C. Promislo Black—12 pieces



White—6 pieces White to play and mate in two moves.

The Valve Theme is an interference theme in which black opens up a line of defense and at the same time closes another line held by the ambushed piece. When a line is opened and the interference takes place with a piece other than the ambushed piece, the term, bi-valve is used. The above problem has four Valve variations, and is believed to be the earliest version containing so high a number of valve lines. It originally appeared in the "Pittsburgh Post" in 1923.

Solution to Problem No. 106 The key move is 1. Q-B7!

With what the writer believes to be pardonable and justifiable pride he presents here the finest game he ever played in his entire chess career.
