

Better Health Leader Named

George Probert of Torrance Pharmacy Heads Local Campaign

Lloyd C. Thompson, national director of the physicians expansion bureau, today announced completion of plans to start a Better Health campaign in Torrance under the sponsorship of Torrance Pharmacy, Cabrillo and Cravens. Plans were made by Thompson to inflame the health campaign following a series of conferences with some of the leading physicians of Torrance.

The better health campaign is designed to implant in the minds of the people the fact that modern medicine can conquer virtually every ill of mankind if treatment is begun soon enough. To this end, the Torrance Pharmacy urges frequent examination by a medical doctor, and each Thursday releases one of a series of health talks to instruct the public on matters of medical care.

Thompson states that "it is sanely ethical to publicize the dignity of the old arts of materia medica and pharmacopoeia. If we expect to seriously interest the laity in better health individually, a goal which the bureau has set before it, according to Mr. Thompson, is "to eliminate eventually every form of medical quackery and malpractice."

Something over \$700,000,000 is spent annually on quackery by suffering humanity, Mr. Thompson said as he pointed to the need of the public being educated to the importance of obtaining real medical care. Thompson also commended the high standards and professional attainments of the medical men whom he has contacted in Torrance during the time that he has been arranging for the publication of the health talks.

New Committee To Promote Election of Board Members

Dr. George P. Shilder, of Torrance, and C. P. Roberts of Wilmington, are named on the list of 49 directors of the new Security of Schools Federation, organized to promote the candidacy of four new members of the Los Angeles school board. The candidates are Mrs. Gertrude H. Rounsaville, president of the Tenth District P. T. A., Mrs. Margaret L. Clark, past president of the Los Angeles Business and Professional Women's club, Roy J. Becker, and John P. Dalton. Their platform specifies security of schools, for citizens, parents, children, employees, with a fifth plank setting out the security of schools as an American institution, through the "absolute prevention of the preaching of forcible overthrow of our government; yearly oath of allegiance to the constitution of the United States by every employe of the school district, including members of the board of education."
