

AQUEDUCT DAY is significant FOR TORRANCE

SAN DIEGO.—The gigantic water and power development, aggregating more than \$400,000,000 in value, which now is under way in the West, will be recognized during Aqueduct Day, June 22, at the California Pacific International Exposition in Balboa Park, according to a statement issued today from Exposition headquarters.

Many visitors are expected from Torrance, one of the leading cities to be benefited by this development program.

Thirty or more teams of expert drillers will contest for the world's records in setting up their drills, boring a four-foot hole through a 25-ton boulder, and then dismantling their implements. Between now and that date, elimination contests will be held at all aqueduct camps, assuring that only the most expert drillers will compete in this event.

News From Washington

Now that the Supreme Court has upheld the President and Congress in their monetary program, Washington is slowly recovering from a bad attack of the jitters. From the time the gold cases were submitted to the Supreme Court until the hour of the decision, there was a fear and trembling as to the outcome.

Those who had stood by the President on this very important program breathed much easier upon the action of the majority of the supreme court.

One of the happy surprises in the decision of the supreme court was the position of Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes. While some years ago he was considered a conservative, in many of his decisions he has been clearly on the side of the progressives in the new outlook in behalf of the common people.

It seems to be rather accepted at the present time that the gold standard, as we have known it in the past, is gone for good. Public sentiment seems to be swinging toward a commodity dollar that will not fluctuate as has the gold dollar. With practically all the gold in the world stored in the vaults of the United States, France and England, it has disappeared from circulation and it is not sufficient in quantity to form an adequate basis for the circulating medium required to transact business. So somewhere in the offing, perhaps at an international conference, there probably will be a reconsideration of the metals used for money in which king gold must surrender the position so long held, and at which a much wider use of silver will be approved.

Also a strong sentiment is growing in Congress to wrest the use of government credit of the country from the banks and restore it to the government. Already the bankers are flooding the newspapers with propaganda against a currency controlled by politicians. That is a common method used to discredit the control of paper currency by the government in the interests of all people.

The Townsend old age pension letters are still coming to members of Congress by the drayloads. The supporters of the plan in California seem to be writing to all the members from all parts of the union. The Townsend followers have aroused intense interest to the old age pension proposal. Meanwhile, a very large number of petitions have been sent in from Oklahoma and adjoining states advocating the Will Rogers bill for old age pensions which provides for \$30 per month instead of the President's program of \$15 per month. While most of the Townsend advocates write courteous letters, some of them are threatening and abusive. It was one of these threatening letters that aroused Congressman Thomas L. Blanton of Texas to arise on the floor of the House and to pitch into the Townsend

and some of the other members of Little Congress started a protest at the meeting before the Kingfish arrived. Haskell however was master of the situation and successfully blocked the opposition. However, some of the members of the House resented the action of Tidwell and threatened him with the loss of his job in the postoffice. Since Senator Long is one of the foremost members of the Senate and never runs from a fight, there is a lot of conversation in the corridors concerning the old question of free speech. Whether the uproar will quiet down or some one made to suffer, remains to be seen.

The Democrats have held another caucus on patronage. Like the others, it turned out to be a riot. Newspapers have circulated the story that ten thousand jobs are to be parceled out to the Democratic members of Congress. That is just another lot of hooey and has no foundation in fact. But the report causes the members of Congress much embarrassment and to receive hundreds of applications for jobs that do not exist.
