

Sound Platform Chosen By Four Candidates

All Favor Steel Construction For Elementary School Buildings

Torrance voters will no doubt look with interest on the candidacy of William H. Henry, Robert H. Kee, Guy E. Matteson and Mrs. Clara Norris Rakestraw, who announce their campaign for election to the Los Angeles city school board in this issue of the Herald.

All four of these candidates publicly express themselves as being in favor of steel construction for elementary school buildings.

Torrance, being a steel town, has more than a passing interest in this type of construction. It means business for the Torrance mills, payrolls for the men employed there, and a healthy activity for the community over a continued period.

Experiments have shown that steel is well adapted to building uses. Small homes are being constructed of steel, and more will be built as people become acquainted with the desirable features of this type of building.

William H. Henry, at present a member of the board who is seeking re-election, has made good. Robert H. Kee, a personal friend of the Rev. Kemp J. Winkler of Torrance, is a former die and tool-maker, a member of the American Legion, active worker in the Y. M. C. A. and a business executive. Guy E. Matteson is a labor leader and author. Mrs. Rakestraw, a sister of Senator George W. Norris of Nebraska, is an educator, club leader, and prominent in civic work.

Their platform, as stated in their announcement elsewhere in this issue, is as follows: 1. We favor steel frames for all one-story elementary buildings in the Los Angeles school district.

Journalist From Shanghai Visitor Here

Ruth Benedict, staff member of the North China Daily News, published at Shanghai, was an interesting visitor at the Herald office this week. Miss Benedict has been in newspaper work in China since 1920 except for a few years' assignment at Vienna. Asked for her opinion regarding the possibilities of a war between Japan and China, Miss Benedict stated that she saw little likelihood of any major hostilities, although she admitted that Manchukuo had been definitely lost to China.

Miss Benedict commented on the lively style of American journalism as contrasted with the more reserved British style as practiced in Shanghai. She took a copy of the Herald with her and said she was going to show her managing editor the new style of head letters recently inaugurated by the Torrance paper. She leaves Sunday on the President Coolidge for China.

While in Torrance, Miss Benedict was the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Torrance C. Welch, whom she met in Shanghai and also in Vienna when the Torrances were on a world tour.
