GREAT DISPLAY OF SPRING FLOWERS

The annual spring flower festival will be held at Arvin within the next two weeks. Flowers there are all in bloom and the sight of these piles of poppies, lupins, sun cups and other varieties in their variegated colors is almost bewildering. The view to motorists coming down from the grapevine is of a vast carpet of purple, orange and gold. For Lenten Meals

Baked Barracuda (Bernstein) (Serves two). Wipe fillet of barracuda with salted cloth. Place in saucapan, season with salt, pepper and paprika; sprinkle with chopped green onions, place about four slices of tomatoes on top and bake about 15 to 20 minutes in hot oven.

Baked Halibut (Family Style). Cut as much halibut as required, allowing about eight ounces for each person. Cut halibut in strips, dip in oil or melted butter, sprinkle with salt and white pepper and a few drops of lemon juice, roll in fresh bread crumbs and bake in a well buttered or greased pan in moderate heat oven about 20 to 25 minutes. Serve with quartered lemon and melted butter.

Salmon Loaf (Wall) (Serves six). Blend together two and one-half cups of cooked fresh fish, or one can of salmon, one cup of grated bread crumbs, two beaten eggs, one cup of milk, one teaspoonful of lemon juice, one-half teaspoonful of paprika, one-half teaspoonful of salt, one tablespoonful of chopped parsley and one tablespoonful of onion juice. Place in a greased baking dish. Sprinkle top with a thin layer of bread crumbs. Bake in a hot oven for 30 minutes or until crumbs are browned. Serve with a white sauce.

Broiled Sandabs. Season fish liberally with salt and pepper. Rub over with melted fat. Place on rack close to the fire at first to sear the surface as quickly as possible. Gradually remove to a lower position as the fish cooks, turning as needed until tender. When cooked and a golden brown remove to a hot platter. Butter well, season with salt and pepper and pour over it a tablespoonful of chopped parsley and lemon juice. Serve garnished with delicate green lettuce leaves.

California Chicken Pie 1 can tuna (large) 2 carrots, diced 2 medium potatoes, diced 1 medium onion, chopped 1 cupful green peas 1 tablespoonful butter 2 tablespoonfuls flour 1 cupful milk 1/2 teaspoonful salt 1/2 teaspoonful paprika 1/2 teaspoonful pepper Pastry: 1/2 lb. carrots, potatoes, onions and peas together in a small amount of salted water until tender. Make a white sauce as follows: Melt the butter, add the flour, and cook until bubbling; add the milk gradually and cook until smooth and thickened. Add seasonings and mix sauce with the tuna. Line a baking dish with plain pastry, fill with the vegetables and creamed fish in layers, cover with an upper crust in which vent holes have been made, and bake in a hot oven at 475° F. till the crust is brown.

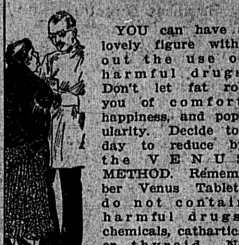
