

Inter-Oceanic University To Sail In June

California Takes Lead in Launching Combined Travel Study Project

"California is taking the lead in launching the greatest educational advance in years, the Inter-Oceanic University, which will combine travel with study," Dr. Fredric P. Woelner, professor of education at U. C. L. A., announced yesterday.

The noted educational and patriotic leader has been appointed chancellor of the Inter-Oceanic University, a co-educational unit which will enroll 40 students, sailing on the Debeny yacht, Caslana, from Los Angeles harbor, June 29, for a 10-months trip around the world.

A regular university curriculum will be taught by eight distinguished professors from leading American universities. Credit will be earned for two semesters in such fields as social science, art, modern languages, literature and other subjects.

An extensive itinerary is to be followed, including Japan, China, Philippines, Indo-China, Siam, India, Italy, Ireland, Scotland, Norway, Denmark, Germany, Holland, Belgium, England, France, Portugal, Canary Islands, Bermuda, Bahamas, Cuba, Panama, Galapagos Islands and Mexico.

For Lenten Meals

In the Middle Ages in France, sauce makers of Sauciers, licensed by the municipality, sold the "ancestors" of our sauces to royalty and townsmen. In those days, sauces covered up a multitude of defects in fish, meats and other foods. Indeed, many times sauces took the place of refrigeration and made fish palatable after a too long absence from their native element.

Today, however, the object of sauces is to complement fish or other foods, and in so doing to add appreciably to its nutritive value and flavor.

Such fish as haddock, cod, herrings, halibut, salmon and pompano can be bought for very little. A good sauce makes even the least expensive of them an aristocratic food. Canned or fresh oysters and clams, shrimps and fish roe can also be delightfully served with sauces, whose other attribute is the adding of variety to the menu.

Foundation or White Sauce
2 tablespoons butter
1 cup milk
2 tablespoons flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/4 teaspoon paprika

Heat the butter in a sauce pan, stir until it bubbles a little, add the flour slowly, mixed with the seasonings, and stir until well blended. Pour the milk gradually, gradually over the butter and flour mixture. Stir constantly and let it simmer about two minutes until smooth and creamy.

To this cream sauce can be added 1/4 teaspoon or more of curry, for shrimps, or there can be added hard boiled eggs cut in eighths for an egg sauce, for cod, gradually over the milk. Chopped parsley is also a delicious addition to any cream sauce.

Bechamel Sauce
Make a cream sauce as outlined above up to the adding of the milk. Then add one half cup of milk and one half cup of fish stock, one-quarter teaspoon of salt, pepper and a little paprika. Cook until this has thickened, stirring constantly to keep it from becoming lumpy. This sauce can be used with broiled, baked, or fried fish.

To this sauce may be added hard boiled eggs (cut up), parsley, cooked peas and diced carrots.

For a heavier sauce, minced pickles, capers, or cut up shrimps may be added. Catsup or other flavoring sauces can be used with the foundational Bechamel sauce.

Maitre d'Hotel
2 tablespoons butter
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon parsley
A pinch pepper

Leimon
Cream the butter by working it with a wooden spoon. Add the salt and pepper. Cut the lemon in halves and from each half, cut two slices, so that they are of equal size for garnishing. From the end of the lemon which is left, squeeze 1/2 tablespoon juice and add slowly to the butter. Chop the parsley, put 1/2 tablespoon with the butter and use the remainder to sprinkle lightly on the lemon slices. A very small slice of red or green pepper may be added to the butter.

CLERKSHIP draws 11 entries IN TOWNSHIP

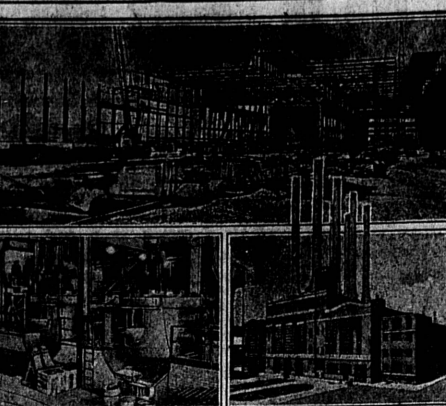

\$23,000,000 Ford Plant Expansion

HENRY FORD is well under way on one of the year's largest single industrial construction projects in the United States—a \$23,000,000 program designed to improve and expand the facilities of the great Rouge Plant of the Ford Motor Company at Dearborn, Mich.

Among the projects are: New hot strip steel rolling mill, \$6,300,000; new sheet steel cold finishing mill, \$3,400,000; modernization of main power house into the largest high pressure steam power house in the world, \$4,600,000; new glass plant, \$3,000,000; modernization of foundry and installation of furnaces and other equipment for production of cast alloy steel parts, \$675,000; and reconstruction of one blast furnace to increase its capacity from 600 to 800 tons daily, to cost \$800,000.

In addition, new tools, machinery and other equipment and facilities in all departments to increase daily output, totals \$3,000,000.
