Lighthouse Wins Honor Flag Again

LOS ANGELES, (U.P.)—For the third straight year, the Point Vicente lighthouse, which flashes warnings to mariners from the tip of the knob of land swerving into the ocean between San Pedro and Redondo Beach south of here, today held the honor flag as the most efficient light on the California coast.

Not a ship has been wrecked on the dangerous Point Vicente reefs since the light was installed eight years ago. Previously, seamen were forced to strain their ears for the whistling buoy.

Every 10 seconds, a 900,000-candlepower beam visible for 20 miles status into the night from the lighthouse. In foggy weather, a huge foghorn sends a roar across the reefs.
