Sunday Storm Brings Rainfall To 20 Inches

Almost two and one-half inches of rain fell in Lomita during the storm which began with a gentle drizzle Sunday morning and climaxed with a smashing downpour shortly after midnight, bringing the total for the season to 20.01 inches. This exceeds the figures for last year at the same date by more than double.

As usual streets in Lomita were flooded by the heavy downpour during the night, the district in the vicinity of the Hydril plant on Lomita boulevard being the worst sufferer. County officials, including Alfred Jones, head of the road department, were on the scene Monday to look over the situation, and it is hoped that the work of constructing a storm drain to serve this section and other areas of Lomita which are regularly inundated will be started as soon as possible.

In Torrance the gauge at the high school showed a total of 1.88 for the storm, season's total, 19.37, as compared with last year's total of 8.79. Due to its natural drainage Torrance suffered little damage beyond the deposit of trash in highways which had been flooded but from which the water soon ran off after the storm had ceased. The major damage noted was along Torrance boulevard where gulleys were cut through the center parking in several places and at the Fern avenue school grounds where dirt from the terrace along this boulevard had been washed out, leaving a couple of sunken areas.

C. of C. Members Will Visit Plant.

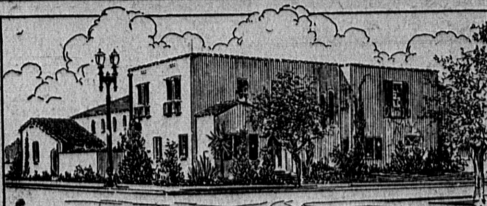

News From Washington

The gold standard is about to pass out of existence. It seems that only three countries, France, Switzerland and Holland, remain on the old gold standard which Grover Cleveland, and Herbert Hoover fought to maintain. All the other countries are entirely off the gold standard or have

such severe restrictions that they are practically off. The greatest factor in the fall and the rout of the gold standard is that all the nations that have gold are hoarding it so that it has almost completely passed out of circulation.

The shortage of a sufficient circulating medium is not only a most serious problem in the United States but exists throughout the world. We recently have had two very striking examples of the international necessity of a broader base for money. One was in the sale of the Chinese railroad by Russia to Japan. In this transaction, about one-third is payable in money and the other two-thirds is payable in goods. In the recent agreement for the transfer of the Saar from France to Germany, a similar transaction occurred in which a part is payable in money and the remainder in minerals. One of the great needs of the world is an international conference that will establish a wider metal base for international use. Since silver is the only other metal available, it appears that a much wider use of that metal is "bound to come," using an expression of old Squire Hobbs, of Missouri, my first tutor in economic reform.

Congress is not expediting business, this session at the same rate of speed that it did during the Seventy-third Congress. In the last Congress, the members were on their toes from the first day until the last. This session has displayed much more criticism of administration measures and is spending much more time in debate and in securing slower results. While Congress is doing much fiddling and fussing around, the President has gone on a vacation. It is said that the President realizes that he is entering into a hard contest with Congress and is preparing himself for the ordeal. The President has finally won out on the big appropriation bill for relief and recovery but there are several other measures that are still under consideration in the committees. Among these bills are the Wheeler-Rayburn bill for the control of holding companies; the administration banking bill which will lessen the control of the bankers and place more authority in the government control of banking; the NRA is due for a revision and an extension; a revision of the pure food laws is supposed to be considered at this session; one of the most important of all is the security legislation which includes old age pensions and unemployment insurance.

In the last Congress, the President stated his program at the

beginning of the session. This time he appears to be giving the boys plenty of rope and apparently members will have their chests unloaded about the time the hot weather arrives. With the coming of the hot season and the President turning on the political heat, it is anticipated that our last days will be our busy ones this time.

The silver question was injected into the relief and recovery appropriation bill by the Senators but failed to carry when returned to the House. The full silver strength in the House was not polled on this measure for the reason that some members were opposed to injecting side issues into it, which would hold it up for some weeks while the relief funds in certain states had been exhausted. Many members of the House felt the relief and recovery measure should be expedited and not delayed by the injection of other issues.

When I lived on the farm, I was led to believe that the mule was the most patient animal in the world and there is much evidence in favor of the mule.

When I visited the Orient, I decided that the Japanese and Chinese working people were even more patient than the famous Missouri "canary bird." To see Orientals plodding and struggling and staggering under the heaviest load without complaint seemed to me the most patient example that I had ever witnessed.

Now I am beginning to believe that a Congressman is about the most patient animal on the face of the globe. If you could peep into the average Congressman's mail, and note the tasks and requests that are referred to him, the same class with the mule and the Oriental and perhaps give him the best of it for patience. However, a majority of the constituency is reasonable and considerate and it makes it easier for the member to stand up under the wrath of the impatient ones. Once in a while a member of Congress loses his temper and replies in the language of those who attack him but with very few exceptions, he is always courteous, and disdards attacks and insults that frequently reach him.

The sentiment in favor of the control of cotton exchanges and boards of trade that speculate in the products of the farmer has been given a big push by the coup of the speculators recently in forcing down the price of cotton and other farm products. A bill was passed in the House by the last Congress to control the speculations in farm products under the regulation of the government in a manner similar to the stock exchanges which buy and sell and speculate in bonds and stocks. The bill of the last session failed to get through the Senate but the members of the House from the South are on the warpath because of the recent manipulation of cotton. Members of Congress as well as the public are getting irked by the speculation in the necessities of life by a small group of speculators, manipulators and racketeers who never produce a dollar in wealth but enrich themselves by preying on the products and savings of others.

The District of Columbia Committee has set in motion an investigation of the rents in Washington which are exorbitantly high. The landlords of this city are reaping a harvest. The prices of apartments and rooms are out of sight and every hole in the wall and every "dog house," as the slipper of the Torrance Herald would say, "is filled to the limit." Evidently the landlords of Washington are somewhat jittery and are starting a bombardment against members of Congress. I have received resolutions from the apartment house organizations of San Francisco, Los Angeles and Long Beach, against the regulation of rents. But I doubt that these organizations in California very thoroughly understand that Washington apartment owners are getting two and three prices. Nevertheless, this illustrates how any one group rushes to the assistance of its fellow operators.

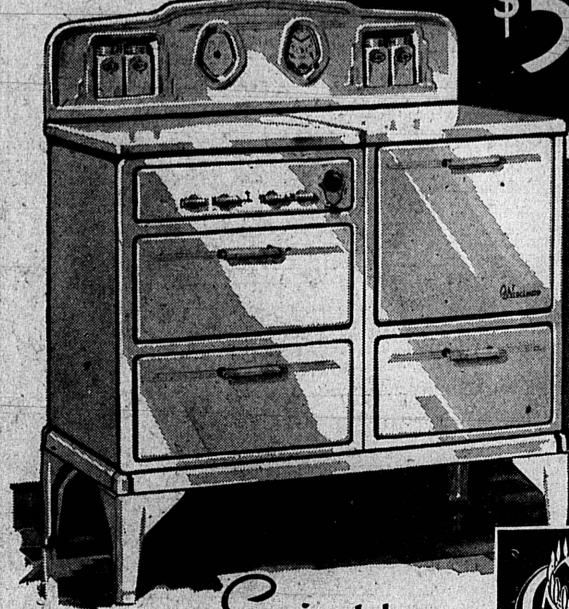
RADIO AND CLOTHES STOLEN AT RANCH

For Lenten Meals

Fish canapes and fish hors d'oeuvres are the most popular prefaces to luncheons, dinners, teas, cocktail parties and mid-night suppers. They give a tang to the menu and whet the alert or faded appetite. Here follow a few easily contrived canapes and hors d'oeuvres:

- Fish Paste I.**
2 cups cooked fish flakes (left over fish that is broken up)
4 tsp. plain vinegar
5 dashes tabasco sauce
1 tsp. salt
2 tsp. butter
1/2 cup mayonnaise
2 tsp. anchovy paste
Combine fish flakes, vinegar, salt, tabasco sauce. Let these stand. Then thoroughly blend the mayonnaise and anchovy paste. Cream the butter, add it to the fish flakes and work it into a paste. Add the mayonnaise and mix it all until it is a smooth paste.
- Fish Paste II.**
1 cup cooked fish flakes
4 tsp. plain vinegar
3/4 tsp. white pepper
3 egg yolks—hard cooked
3/4 tsp. salt
Tabasco sauce
1/4 tsp. ground mustard
2 tsp. butter
1/4 tsp. sugar
Combine the vinegar, tabasco sauce, sugar, salt, pepper and pour this mixture over the fish flakes. Mash the egg-yolks and work them into a paste. Cream the butter, add the fish flakes and work these into a paste, combine this thoroughly with the egg-yolks. This is an excellent foundation recipe which may be more highly seasoned, if desired.

Canapes

Remove crusts from thin slices of bread. Cut several times across the slice, almost through, then turn the slice and cut so as to form diamond shaped and triangular pieces. Put them onto a pan and toast them in the oven until nicely browned on both sides. Brush each slice with melted but-

ter and set them back in a hot oven until the butter bubbles. Remove and break the slices into small pieces. This toast will stay crisp. It is now ready for use as canapes.

Fish Flakes and Mayonnaise
Spread pieces of toast with fish paste No. 1. Cut a thin slice of plimento into inch lengths and set one piece on each canape.

Egg and Fish Canapes
Spread pieces of toast with fish paste No. 1. Sprinkle with chopped parsley.

Hors d'oeuvres
Celery Stuffed With Fish Paste
Celery stalk, 3-inch pieces. Fill the groove with fish paste No. 1. Sprinkle each "fill" with paprika.

Stuffed Eggs
Stuff halves of hard-cooked eggs with fish paste No. 1 or No. 2, and garnish with paprika or slices of tomato.

Marinated and Blamark herrings cut up and served with toast make delicious canapes and appetizers, as well as anchovy paste, caviar and sardines.
