



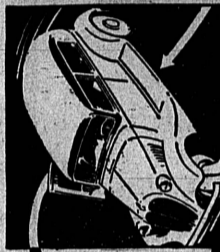
### League Berths Cinched

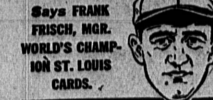

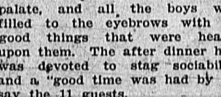

Saturday, April 20, U.S.C. vs. U.C.L.A. in track and field at the Los Angeles Coliseum. Pick the Trojans, with their great balanced team to win with ease. In fact the meet will only be a workout for them, to get in shape to take the Stanford Indians in stride the following week, at Palo Alto.

Pete Zamperini, local athlete, and holder of the Pacific Coast Junior College record for the mile run has earned his varsity track letter and sweater at U.S.C. Pete is the first and only Torrance athlete who has ever earned a varsity letter on the Trojan campus.

Here's a bit of interesting news on the Leuzinger-Torrance track meet held last Friday. Four boys of the Torrance squad made more points for their team, than the entire Leuzinger team put together. Bobby (Bullet) Wertz was high point man for the meet, taking first in the 100 and 220, and running lead off man for the relay team. Bobby was responsible for 14 points, earning his letter in track the first meet. Hubert Luck and Truman Waugh followed close behind, with 9 1/2 points each. Johnny McFadden was fourth man with 7 1/2 points to his credit. These four athletes were responsible for 37 points, more than half of the total Torrance score.

Glenn Cunningham, world's greatest middle-distance runner, is having his trouble, by being famous. Cunningham, who concluded his collegiate career at Kansas University last year, and now is seeking a master's degree in physical education at the University of Iowa, still is in great demand at all track meets.

Cunningham made this reply to a newspaper reporter of Kansas City recently. "I like to run, and I've had my greatest indoor season this winter, but it would be something of a relief to stay in Iowa City long enough to get more work done. I've been here just one week-end since the indoor season opened last winter. I can't do much work on my thesis at that rate."

Cunningham holds the world's indoor and outdoor records for the mile and the indoor record for the 1,500 meters.

Despite the fact that the 1934-35 Notre Dame basketball team had the poorest record in 10 years, it drew 109,400 persons, the largest in the school's history. The team won 13 games of 22, according to reports from the Catholic school.

Helen Stephens, of Fulton, Mo., recently made her bid for the Olympic games. Helen who is only 17 years old, beat the great Stella Walsh in the 60-meter dash by equaling the world's record for women at 6.8 seconds.

According to observers she has very little form in her events, but has the necessary ability to be another Babe Didrikson.

She also holds the national titles in the standing broad jump and the shotput. Amateur Athletic officials expect this new find, to win many honors for Uncle Sam in the coming Olympic games.

While we are speaking about athletes here is one for the baseball players of the United States to ponder over. Nellie Twardzik, 15-year-old Dudley, Mass., high school girl is out for first base on the Bartlett high nine this year.

A sophomore, Nellie is competing with several boys for the 220 and broad jump, and ran anchor man on the relay for a total of 16 1/2 points.
