

Final Deed For Western Avenue Progress Given

County Officials Consider Asking SERA Labor For Grading Work

The final deed that clears up the right of way for Western avenue between its present terminus near Torrance and San Pedro was being turned over to the county road department this week, it was learned in a check-up.

Within the next week or 10 days, the deeds are expected to be turned over to the supervisors for recording, thus terminating a task that has required several years' intensive work by the county right of way department to acquire the right of way.

County officials are to consider shortly the advisability of filing an application with the SERA for labor to grade the roadway through

Dear Grover:

In last week's issue of the Torrance Herald, I note several statements relative to the recall that it is in the interests of truth and fairness should be corrected.

It is stated that my petition for the office of City Attorney was denied by the council. The fact of the matter is that I have never at any time sought the office held by Mr. Charles T. Rippey. A petition was filed in my behalf by some 450 residents of Torrance, urging my appointment to the then vacant office of City Judge, but this petition was filed prior to April 1934, and was never submitted to the present city council. You will further recall that I had offered to serve in this office without pay.

The issues in the recall movement are neither political nor personal, and the statement that it is a feeble attempt to build up a spring campaign for the re-election of W. T. Klusman to the city council is unfounded and untrue. I believe that the interests of the voters, taxpayers, and water consumers will best be served by the councilmen facing the issues rather than attempting to cloud them by shouting "Klusman."

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Tax Bills Will Show Proportion Of Welfare Cost

Tax Bills Will Disclose Amount Segregated for Charity Expense

Tax bills of Los Angeles county for 1934-35 will show to each taxpayer what proportion of his taxes is being expended for welfare and charity and what proportion for other purposes.

The county board of supervisors today adopted a resolution offered by Supervisor Gordon L. McDonough instructing the county tax collector to have such a breakdown of the general levy stamped on the face of the tax bills.

This will be in addition to the other breakdowns of the total levy which have appeared hitherto on all tax bills.

Of the \$38,000,000 general county levy for 1934-35, only \$14,000,000, McDonough stated, was for the ordinary administration of government; the other \$24,000,000 was used for various welfare and relief purposes.
