### RECIPES

At COOKING SCHOOL

Editor's Note: Through oversight, the following two recipes were omitted in last week's issue:

- GUM DROP COOKIES
  - 4 eggs
  - 2 cups brown sugar
  - 2 cups cake flour
  - Pinch of salt
  - 1/4 cup nuts
  - 1 cup gum drops (cut fine)
  - Beat eggs, add sugar and flour and mix well. Add the rest of the ingredients. Spread on greased cookie sheet.
  - Topping
  - 3 tablespoons butter
  - 2 tablespoons orange juice
  - Brown sugar to make thick.
  - Spread on cookies. Bake at 370 degrees.
- TOMATO JUICE
  - 2 cans tomato juice
  - 1 tablespoon sugar
  - 1 tablespoon lemon juice
  - 1 tablespoon Foundation Royal
  - 1 onion
  - 1/2 teaspoon allspice
  - 1/2 teaspoon cloves
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1 tablespoon horseradish.
  - 1 bay leaf
