Navy Enlistment Increase Ordered

Only the highest type of young men are eligible. They are required to pass a rigid physical and mental examination and be between the age of 17 and 25.

Schools Will Close For Lack of Funds

Inglewood Union and Leuzinger high schools will close a week earlier than scheduled, because of the lack of funds to continue, according to the Hawthorne-Lennox Advertiser. Schools will close on June 7, although the teachers had offered to serve the additional week without pay. Their offer was not accepted because they would not be covered by compensation insurance unless they were receiving their salaries. An additional holiday was declared for Friday, May 31, the day after Memorial Day.

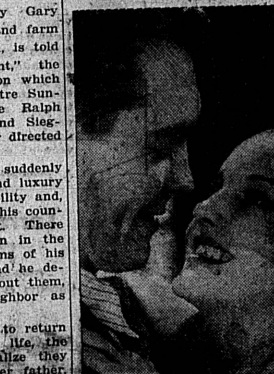
