Paris Styles

PARIS. (U.P.)—Rosine Paris, whose mid-season collection has just opened, has gone in for glowing shades of deep blue and purple. This house, which is comparatively new, has swept fashion circles by storm, and rightly so, for here is achieved a truly Parisian chic that few couturiers can rival.

Outstanding features noted at Rosine Paris were longer, and fuller skirts. The fulness of the skirt comes from the waist rather than a skirt insertion, and frequently comes from a shoulder yolk. Instead of stitched or deeply pressed pleats, there are folds of the material caught into place and allowed to fall loosely. Another new note is the use of a wavy, scalloped line of double stitching at the side seams, and in some cases the front and back seams are made into an inch-wide tuck which makes a scalloped line.

An evening dress in a deep, bright blue has a square neckline in back and front. Pleated panels, allowed to hang loosely, are caught at the top of the corsage and again at the waist which skirt jacket accompanies the gown and when this is put on, it becomes a cocktail dress. The jacket, which is caught together at the nape of the neck with a red rosette, is high at the throat and has full elbow length sleeves. It hangs loosely in back, with a bolero effect revealing a part of the bare back.
