CHURCHES OF CHRIST, SCIENTIST. "When the wicked spring as the grass, and when all the workers of iniquity do flourish; it is that they shall be destroyed for ever." This verse from the Psalms is the Golden Text in the Lesson-Sermon on Sunday in all branches of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass. Boulder Dam Power To Play Important Part In Industry

Power from Boulder dam will pay an important part in the operation of the Hughes-Mitchell Processes Company's Torrance plant on Normandie avenue, according to E. P. Querl, industrial commissioner for the Los Angeles chamber of commerce.

A new process, such as is employed in the Hughes-Mitchell plant, requires only 24 hours to refine ores, all under one roof, and the Torrance plant is the first of its kind.

Under the old method, Querl explained, ore reduction required 48 days, each step taking place at widely different places in the country.

Querl explained the favorable factors in the development of the Los Angeles metropolitan area, which takes in Torrance. First, it attracts large concerns because of the center of a great buying power; second it is favorably surrounded by areas with many raw products, particularly oil; third that the harbor offers cheap shipping facilities; and further, that abundant power from Boulder dam will shortly be available for manufacturing plants.

"Shipping facilities offered by the harbor," Querl said, "have brought about the building of refineries. Oil is the most basic factor in world commerce today. It produces fuel for industry. Eighty percent of the electricity used in the county is made by burning oil."

The Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce now is endeavoring to develop a silk industry here, Querl said. At present, raw silk comes to the harbor and is shipped all the way to New Jersey for milling and then the unfinished fabric is sent to Pennsylvania for coloring and finishing. The whole process could be done in Los Angeles at a great saving.
