Gauchos Win Title

Undefeated Narbonne Team Noses Out Gardena and Torrance In Finals

Narbonne, Torrance and Gardena battled neck and neck for the Marine League championship in the finals held at Leuzinger Wednesday afternoon, and finished in the order named. Narbonne, which has been undefeated this season, took first with 49 2-3 points, Torrance second, with 40 1-3 and Gardena third with 37.

Gregory of Jordan, North Long Beach, was high point man with three firsts, Bob Henderson of Gardena second with two firsts and a second.

Hubert Luck, who ran in spite of his injured foot, turned in the best performance for Torrance, taking third in the 100 and second in the 440. Luck nosed out Gregory to clinch the relay for Torrance, and the Tartar four set a new meet record for this event of 1:34.

Luck was limping all the way in his lap of the relay but sprinted gamely at the finish to snatch the tape from the Jordan man. Wend Adzovich and McCadden had built up a nice lead of eight yards for Luck, which ordinarily would have been enough to give him first by a long margin. But Luck was so badly hampered by his damaged instep he was forced to lose ground and at the last turn was running second. Hubert put all he had into the last few yards and won by inches.

Zamparini, running practically alone in the mile, lowered his own state record by five-tenths of a second, and set a new Marine League mark at 4:27.3, a mark which will probably stand for some years to come in this section.

Austin, who has been competing in the junior division all year, was switched to the varsity in the pole vault and tied for fourth place.

Spud Murphy's Bluebirds lost a heartbreaking game to the Hollywood outfit Tuesday night, 14-6, a game that was filled with excitement from start to finish but never in doubt after the third inning.

The Birds tossed the game away on errors. Over anxious to show up the Neva clan, the Bird infield had a nightmare of nerves that resulted in all the possible combinations of misplays, and ended in a display of temper by Russ Painter that sent him to the showers.

Louie Neva failed to show, but Brudder Paul was on hand to cut capers in the catcher's position. Paul has at last realized his ambition to be the backstop, but the combination of me and my brudder may be broken up if Louie switches to the Long Beach Admirals as rumor has it he will this week.

With the score 10-1 against them, Painter, chased from the field and Russ Coggins, who pitched for Hollywood, going great, the Birds settled down in the sixth to play baseball and staged a rally in each of the next three innings that had the Torrance fans pop-eyed with excitement and hope. Poncho Fabregat put on a clown act that rocked the stands with laughter and all but had Brudder Paul and Coggins in hysterics with ill-concealed rage.

Hopes died after the eighth when the Birds had crawled up to a 10-6 score but were blanked in the next frame.

Joe Taylor, a new recruit, pitched for the Birds in the first half and was relieved by Kratloff who held the Hollywood outfit until the ninth when he was touched for four hits, two of them homers.

The team was handicapped by the lack of Acebedo, the little Mexican ace, who is leading the team in hitting, Mitchell, and to add to the disappointment, Joe Casser, a new chucker who is said to be a topnotcher, failed to show as promised because of an important family event. Acebedo was detained by work, but all three of these boys will probably be with the team when the Birds play Downey here tonight.

According to Murph, Russ Painter is through. His peevish performance made no hit with the stands. Russ swaggered off the field shouting 'I'm the best player

you've got and you don't know it,' which modest remark was greeted with loud and raucous razzberries.

Next Tuesday night the park will be dark as the Birds go to Huntington Park for their second game with that outfit.
