Truck Caravan To Visit Here Friday Morning

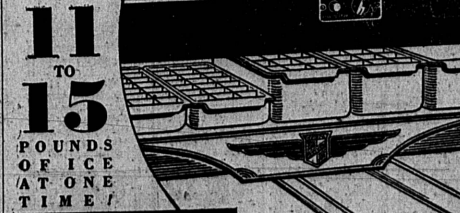
