

Work Will Begin Shortly On Pipe Line From Owens Valley to Harbor

With an allocation of \$257,283 in labor granted by the SERA, construction is expected to begin shortly on the city of Los Angeles' new \$644,000 Western avenue pipeline that will bring Owens valley aqueduct water to San Pedro and the harbor area for the first time.

Materials, principally the 30-inch main, will cost \$851,767, according to engineers of the water and power department, bringing the total cost to \$644,000.

A total of 880 men per shift will be given employment on the project under the SERA, and 90 days is the limit in which the pipeline must be laid and the work completed.

Bids on the pipe were taken several months ago, and it was understood that the city planned to begin construction work at once under force account. Later, an application was filed with the SERA, and word of its approval came this week from Frank Y.

McLaughlin, state administrator for the SERA.

Water for the harbor district, after October, will come down the aqueduct across San Fernando valley, into Hollywood reservoir, and across Los Angeles on Western avenue. The large line now is laid as far south as Manchester boulevard. At approximately 100th street, there is a large reservoir with which the pipeline will be connected, to equalize the flow and maintain a uniform and constant pressure in the line.

A great part of this sum has already been pledged to the Los Angeles Bureau of Power and Light and the Metropolitan Water District each having promised \$10,000. Banks, hotels and prominent stores have also pledged themselves to contribute to the financing.
