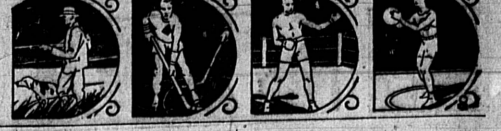

Sheiks Win Airtight Ten-Inning Thriller Goes to Hollywood Nine Tuesday Night By 4-3 Score

After holding the Hollywood Sheiks to a 2-1 score through seven innings of airtight ball, the Bluebirds won and lost the game Tuesday night all in the space of a few minutes. Fans were jubilant in the eighth when Joe Taylor, who had been pitching corking ball all the way, made the circuit of the bases on errors to tie up the score, and Moon followed him around on a single, two sacrifices and another single by Landreth to make the count 3-2 in favor of the Birds.

The joy of the stands was short-lived. In their half of the ninth, Dick, Hollywood third baseman, drove a sharp grounder between first and second. The ball rolled out to Hal Forney who slammed it back to first. Landreth was caught off guard as Dick had returned to the base and he juggled the ball. Dick went to second where some more juggling took place and he beat it to third. Vonderhabe also muffed the catch and the Sheiks had tied the score.

Taylor, who after the debacle which knotted the count, was in a bit of a hole with two men on base nobly to the occasion and fanned the next two, retiring the side. The Birds were out in short order in their half.

Taylor got into another jam in the tenth when Paul Neva drove one over Hobbleman's head for a homer. Hobbleman ran back for the catch and got his hands on the ball but fell and dropped it. Vieth walked. Kough was safe on an error and Dick walked, tilting the bases. Van Vliet was called to the mound and saved the day, as Corgins fouled out, Wilkins fanned and Duda filed out to Vonderhabe.

The Birds made a desperate effort to come back in their half, but lost their best chance when Red Moon tried to stretch a single. He made second all right but over-ran the bag and was tagged out when he dived back.

Van Vliet, first man up had grounded out and Vonderhabe and Mitchell were out ending the inning. Final score 4-3 in favor of the Sheiks.

Louie (the elusive) Neva failed to show up as advertised. According to report he has signed with the Huntington Beach Oilers. Brudner Paul had to be calmed by the umpire Scharder at one stage of the pastime. Umps told Paul "one more crack and out you go" which brought the ex-Bluebird up all standing. Umpire Buck also took offense at a crack from a Sheik during the ninth and ordered him to the showers.

Saturday, June 15, Los Angeles Coliseum. U.S.C. vs. Jesse Owens (Ohio State). Graves, Hollywood vs. Zamperini, Torrance (All-City track meet). This is the dish offered for sport fans in Southern California. Sports of S.C. will try and beat Owens in the 100-yard dash. Roy Draper of S.C. will try and beat the Negro in the turling. Staley and Cope, S.C. will try and beat Owens in the low hurdles. Olson of S.C. will try and beat Owens in the broad jump and there is a rumor that the great Jesse Owens will also enter in the 440-yard dash, if so Johnny McCarthy will have to move to beat him for the first place spot. In other words the great U.S.C. team will have its hands full trying to take a first place, and the scoring in this meet is "one point for a first, other places gain a big '0'."

Now for the other great event of the afternoon, Louis Zamperini, "Torrance Tornado" will have his hands full in taking a first over Phil Graves the "Hollywood Idol." The big question in Torrance today is "Can the champion, Zamperini beat this great miler? My answer is yes, providing Louis does not let him get too far ahead. In other words, Louie had better not continue his old habit of eating his lunch, the first lap. If he does, Graves will win! Neither boy has ever been beaten in high school competition (varsity) and both are running their last race as a high school athlete. Time for the distance? Well I think that the winner (Zamperini) will set up an unheard of high school record at 4:17. Unless history repeats itself. Usually when two fast boys get together, the time is slow. But these two greats had better not run too slow, if they do a little one-eyed boy from Belmont high, Madrid, who runs around 4:30 will take their stride for an upset.

Graves, who is vain, and is not liked by his own fellow trackmen has openly boasted to everyone, including Zamperini, that he will win with ease over the quiet, modest and well loved by all champion.

Louie has only run to win this year, should open up in this race and run the distance in the fast time of 4:17. A race this fast will not hurt him, as all of the so-called critics in the newspaper world have tried to impress upon him that it would. This is absurd. Louie has never extended himself, and is to my belief, capable of running around 4:12 today if he had to, of course this would be out of the question, BUT A 4:17 MILE IS NOT OUT OF THE QUESTION, and will not hurt him at all, but would do him a world of good for the Olympics next year.

The townspeople of this city should turn out in full strength Saturday to see their pride run his last race for Torrance high school (except cross country next year). Louis has gained more publicity and a greater name in the sporting world for Torrance than the rest of local athletes put together. It would make the boy feel great to know that his city and friends are backing him to the limit for his last race as a high school athlete, and probably his hardest race of his career. Citizens of Torrance, you should be at the Coliseum Saturday afternoon.

Now a word to Louis Zamperini you can and should open up once and show the people what you can do. To Pete Zamperini, trainer and Bernie Donahue, coach, it is up to you to have this boy ready for the greatest mile run of his life, and his last for his Alma Mater. His last stab at a new world's men's record. Will you two men feed Louie before the race instead of letting him eat his lunch while running the first lap? He should run the first lap in 68" . . . 880 in 2:9 . . . 1829 in 3:15 and the mile in at least 4:17. Now it's all geared out Louie, all you have to do is run. Good Luck.

Milers In Spotlight

Zamperini Against Graves Will Furnish Thrill of All-City Meet

Zamperini of Torrance vs. Graves of Hollywood next Saturday. Second only in interest to the performance of Jesse Owens who will be the star attraction at the U. S. C. Ohio State meet at the Coliseum on June 15 will be the duel for supremacy between the high school milers, in their part of the track program.

At the qualifying heats last Friday Zamperini took his heat easily in 4:35. Graves sailed along in his qualifying trial to a mark of 4:28.2 which is only .9 seconds slower than the world's champ has run the distance in a meet this year.

Graves has been waiting a long time for a chance at Zamperini, although he passed up one chance in the Southern California finals to enter the 880 which he won handily in 1:57.8. He has been undefeated in two years. Zamperini has not lost a race in three years, has more varied experience than the Hollywood flash and has been up against better competition in winning the A. A. U. 1500 meters last year against college runners.

Zamperini and Graves are pretty much alike in style, both tall and rangy with a long swinging stride. Louie has developed a sprint finish this year, something he needed, and which apparently Graves does not use. Their similarity ends there, for Graves is a typical front runner who likes to get out in the lead and stay there, while Louie has always laid back to let the pack do the running until the last half when he sweeps up and passes them all.

Foxy Louie can change his tactics if it is necessary, and next Saturday the Hollywood flash will not have the easy going he has had against all other competitors. This will be a great race, perhaps the highlight of the afternoon, unless Graves cracks.

Last year when the Torrance ace set a new world's record the great Hooper of Antelope Valley held the spotlight. He was the man to beat, but Hooper was run off his legs and dropped out 50 yards from the finish line, with Mercer of Glendale finishing second to Zamperini.

Torrance qualified one other man in the varsity finals, Hubert Luck, the flash 440 man. Hubert placed fifth in his heat which was won by Bradley of L. A. Poly in 50.3, with Henderson of Gardena second. Hubert spent four days of last week in bed with the measles, and got up out of a sickbed to compete. He ran only to qualify and will make his bid for honors next Saturday. This game lad has been handicapped by an injured foot for most of the season, but he says the rest in bed did his foot a world of good and he now feels in fine shape to make the race of his career this week. First place in the finals will make up to him in some respect for the honors he missed in the Marine League and So. Cal. finals.

Haruki, Class C broad jumper, qualified in his event.

For Narbonne, McClure was the only man to qualify in the varsity events. He will enter the 650. Maryama qualified in the Class C high jump.

Other Marine League qualifiers were Gregory of North Long Beach in the 100 and 220; Henderson of Gardena in the 40; Davis of North Long Beach in the pole vault.

In Class D Yamada of Gardena was the only Marine League qualifier. He will compete in the broad jump, and in Class C Yamashita of Leuzinger qualified in the 100 yard dash; Kita of Leuzinger in the 50; Tanka of Gardena in the 660; Oshiki of Leuzinger in the low hurdles; Nakamura of Leuzinger in the shot put; Oshiki of Gardena and Oshiki of Leuzinger in the pole vault; Haruki of Torrance and Kabuto of Gardena in the broad jump.

Torrance will enter its crack relay team and hopes to take first in this event.

They have a good chance of winning the 4x100, \$80-a-lap relay Saturday. It will be these four boys, Bobby Wertz, Ted Adovitch, John McFadden and Hubert Luck's last race for the school that they have fought so hard for and gave their all the last four years. The town should be proud of its athletes, that Coach Bernie Donahue has developed, and now losses through the cap and gown route.

Moguls Lift Ban Against Compton

Suspension from conference competition, which was meted out to Compton Junior College because of an alleged violation of the rule against post-season games, was lifted at a meeting of the Western Division of Southern California Junior College conference recently and Compton is now back in the fold again. The ban against Compton was cancelled when officials learned that Los Angeles Junior College had been guilty of a similar offense this year and the precedent set left them no recourse but to suspend Los Angeles or reinstate Compton. They chose the latter, since dropping two teams would have been a serious blow to conference athletic programs. Pasadena has withdrawn from the ring in order to try out the experiment of organizing teams among students of the 12th, 13th and 14th year classes with a freshman team from the 11th year class.

Ventura is already using this system, and with Compton and L. A. suspended there wouldn't have been any conference.

All the bonanza turned out to be a farce, with no results beyond a lot of unfavorable publicity.
