PARIS, (U.P.)—Longer and fuller skirts, long full sleeves, draped shoulder lines, bloused corsages, open-work on sleeves and shoulder yokes, the use of sequins on afternoon and evening gowns and a generous sprinkling of dots and checks characterize the new collection of Madame Lanvin.

There are lots of capes, often with splits at the shoulders where there is added fulness. The capes fasten high at the throat, frequently with an extended point similar to a rever. They are shown in wool-broadtail and dyed crimé. Many dresses have capes and one-woolen ensemble in a soft, dull green has a long, full cape which extends to the skirt hem line. The outfit is worn with a blouse of tomato red jersey.

There are lots of jackets, but almost all of them have graceful, cape backs. Coats are fuller and longer to match the gowns. For evening, a changeable taffeta, with huge long sleeves, purple and green tones intermingled, is worn over a magenta gown. A hip-length jacket of white pony skin has a double turn-over collar lined with navy crepe that ties at the chin with a bow.

The figured materials are interesting. One has white clubs on black for a bridge gown. A black faille with white dots has a wide collar of knitted white starched linen and cuffs of the same. Huge white buttons run right down the front of the dress.

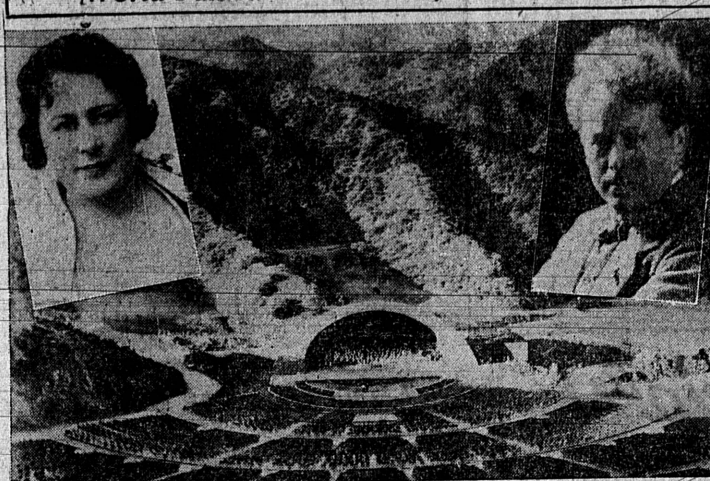
COMPTON LADIES ARE GUESTS HERE

Magic Note Classes Start On July 2

Classes for beginners in piano will again be featured by Kathryne Buffington, pianist and teacher of Torrance. This is the fourth summer these classes have been held and they are being given again this summer at the request of a number of parents who wish their children to begin piano work. Mrs. Buffington, who is a graduate of Washington State College, with a B. A. in music, has attended normal training classes in Los Angeles each summer for a number of years, as part of her plan to keep in touch with the most modern methods of piano teaching, and is again attending classes conducted by Bernard Wagner, of Chicago, who is coming to Los Angeles in July. Mrs. Buffington is also a pupil of Richard Buhlig, eminent pianist and teacher, of Los Angeles.

The Magic Note classes involve many new ideas in piano training for young students, and the children enter into the rhythmic exercises and work on the Magic Board with enthusiasm and zest. Much of the drudgery of piano lessons may be done away with by new, interesting ways of presenting materials by the modern teacher.

Classes grouped according to age will open on July 2, and parents are requested to call the studio, Torrance 368, or come in person to make arrangements before the opening date. A very moderate rate for the lessons is charged, the fact that students are grouped in classes making it possible to charge a small fee for each one.

Although Mrs. Buffington is planning the four-weeks' course for beginners this summer she is also giving private lessons for beginners and advanced students as usual.

If a sufficient number of boys enter the classes there will be a special class for boys only with special emphasis on rhythm or orchestra and other rhythmic training. Class work combines the mechanics of piano playing with ear training, keyboard harmony, sight reading, transposition and the course will end with a piano recital the last of July in which all students will appear.
