Wilmington Young People Hurt In Auto Accident Here

A negro, identified by lodge receipts as Jack Clay, address unknown, was found dead on the state highway near Waveria Friday morning (today). His body was seen by motorists who called the Torrance police station and Officer Percy Bennett of Waveria was detailed to investigate. The body was taken to Stone & Myers mortuary. It is believed that Clay was a victim of a hit and run driver.

The party had been to Torrance to take another young lady to her home and were returning to Wilmington. On making the turn off Torrance boulevard on to Sartori at alleged excessive speed the tire gave way. The car was wrecked. The injured were taken to the Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial hospital where a physician gave them first aid.
