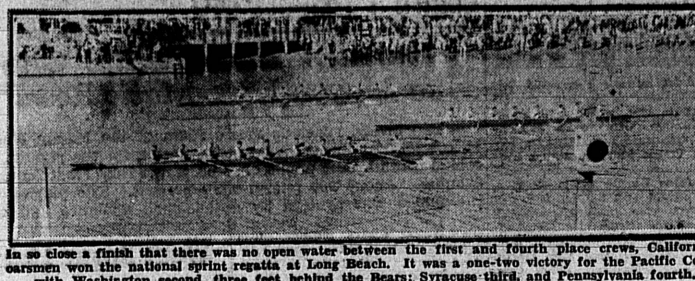
Colored Giants Defeat Merchants
