Woman's Benefit Association Has Great Program

New Youth Movement Is Part of Constructive Work

The 13th quadrennial convention of the Supreme Review of the Woman's Benefit Association will be held in Cleveland, Ohio, July 15 to July 23. This is one of the largest fraternal insurance organizations in the world, with a membership of over 215,000 and \$33,000,000.00 in assets. The association was organized in Cleveland 43 years ago with a charter membership of 23, by Bina West Miller, founder and supreme president.

The question was asked Mrs. Miller what the Woman's Benefit Association has done to attain these objectives under her supervision. And she replied, "Our organization has enrolled women throughout the country... mothers and housewives of the home, business and professional women, women of 40 nationalities, and women in all walks of life, interested in the higher ideals of the American home and attaining their daily hours of work, play and human service to the friendly approval and rewards which come from having a goal and striving for it."

"There are 48 state divisions, and all of the provinces of Canada, which are members of this international organization. This first in membership and first in the greatest increase in membership during the last year. New York is second in membership with over 21,000 and then Pennsylvania, Illinois, Texas, California and Michigan follow closely.

"Every state division of the Woman's Benefit Association has a state director, under the supervision of the international organization, and they are engaged in working out W. B. A. plans suitable to their respective states. There is little dissimilarity in their plans, and always a uniformity in their objectives which promote the interest and activities of the entire group.

"A part of our constructive program," Mrs. Miller said, "is the great question uppermost in all our minds, the 'Youth of America,' Ohio was the first state to recently introduce a 'New Youth Movement'... to emphasize the vital need directed towards the boys and girls of today, and the development of higher ideals first better citizenship. There are over 30,000 junior members of the Woman's Benefit Association between the ages of six months and 16 years, and our National Junior supervisor, state and local supervisors and junior directors help to promote the W. B. A. boys' and girls' activities.

"Our international visiting nurse service and health centers, the W. B. A. camp comprising 212 acres, located in a beautiful spot on Lake Huron near the headquarters at Port Huron, Michigan, are other interesting features of the Woman's Benefit Association," Mrs. Miller said, "which have played a great part in the growth and progress of our organization."
