The All Stars in the new combination will be strictly a home team, playing all games on the local diamond at the park.

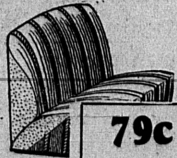

International swimming performances indicate that Holland and the United States will share major honors in the women's events in the 1936 Olympics at Berlin. Holland finished second in the games of 1932, at Los Angeles.

The best woman free style swimmer of Holland is little Willy den Ouden, and probably the one to beat in the games at Berlin. She placed second to Helene Madelon at Los Angeles in the 100 meter dash by a few inches. Here are Miss Ouden's best times in the free style events: 100 meters, 1:04.3; 150 yards, 1:38; 200 meters, 2:28.6; 400 meters, 5:16; and 500 meters, 6:48.4. The latter mark broke the world's record held by Lenore Kight, United States.

The hopes of the United States in the free style events will be upon the following great women swimmers, Olive McKean, Dolores Smith and Lenore Kight. Unless some new star can be developed before 1936.

The following countries also have their great swimmers in the 100 meters, 150 yards and the 400 meters relay, and probably will give the favorite two countries, Holland and the United States a run for their money. Argentina, Brazil, Canada, South Africa and Japan.

The United States will also have their hands full defending their championship in the women's relay race, against the team from Holland. The United States won the event at Los Angeles in the fast time of 4:38. This year teams from Holland, selected from Willy den Ouden, Reik Mastenbroek, Selback, A. Timmermans, T. Baumelster and G. Broviers have times of 4:11.9 and 4:41.2 against women's opposition. At Los Angeles, Holland was second and Great Britain third.

While we are on the subject of swimming, here are the world records for the breast stroke: 100 meters, 1:12.1, J. Carttonnet, France, 1933; 200 yards, 2:25.6, J. Carttonnet, France, 1932; 200 meters, 2:42.6, J. Carttonnet, France, 1933; 400 meters, 5:50.2, E. Rademacher, Germany, 1926; 500 meters, 7:33.1, P. Schwartz, Germany, 1932.

These are the accepted world's records.
